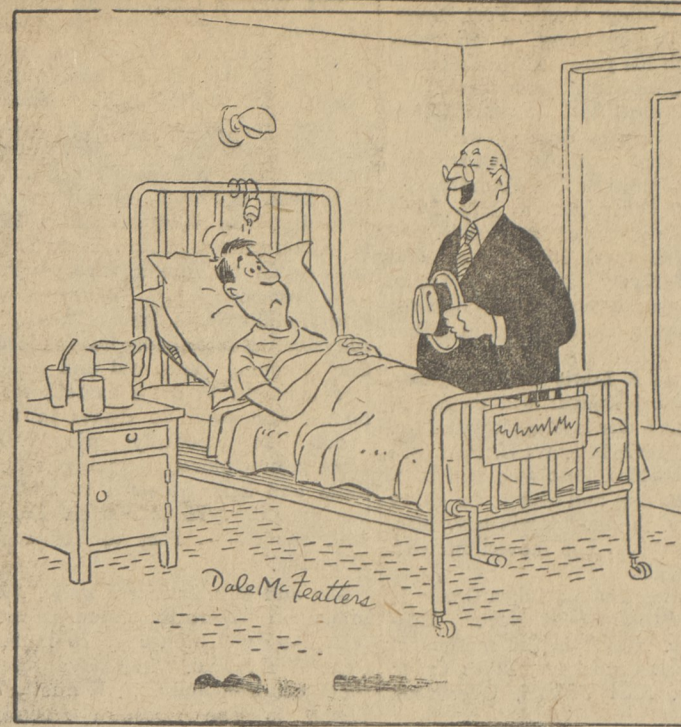
Junior High School PTA Installation Tonight

OH, HOW THEY SANG

It was a unique experience for me last Sunday when I was asked to preach at the Mt. Zion Baptist church on the Heights in Wilkes-Barre. The pastor, Rev. W. J. Atterberry had been a patient in General Hospital until Friday and asked that I preach for him. He conducted the service and all I had to do was preach. Oh, I liked that service. They had six young women in black skirts, short sleeved white blouses and white gloves doing the ushering. Two stood at the doors, two stood part way down the aisle, the other two stood near the front. They showed worshippers to appropriate seats without having to lead them down the aisle. Some trustees and deacons sat up at the communion table. There were two offerings, one for "those needier than we are", and the other for the needs of the church. The choir sang several special numbers in characteristic Negro spiritual tempo. The rhythm gets you! Their bodies gently swayed to the music. When the soloist was singing (no words or music in evidence) I noted some of the choir were quietly humming. That soloist sang as though she were preaching to us. Her face was most expressive. There was something I just felt way down deep all through the service, something I can't explain. When I preached I know I shouted so I got to coughing, but my preaching wasn't anything compared with the way those ladies and men sang.

Then from that high point I came home and we went to St. Stephens for the oratorio. It was hot! I mean the weather! But we sat through that two hour oratorio and wouldn't have missed it for the world. I don't need to get to going on that, for I have raved about it before. If the folks in the Dallas area don't know what a whizz of a music director Clifford Balshaw is, I don't know how I'm capable of doing it from over this end of the Back Mountain. Did you know that he made a new English translation of Haydn's German? Well he did! And that is what the oratorio sang.

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
