While seated in her favorite rocker, she holds another which was built for her by her father before he joined the Union forces in the Civil War and died in a prison camp.

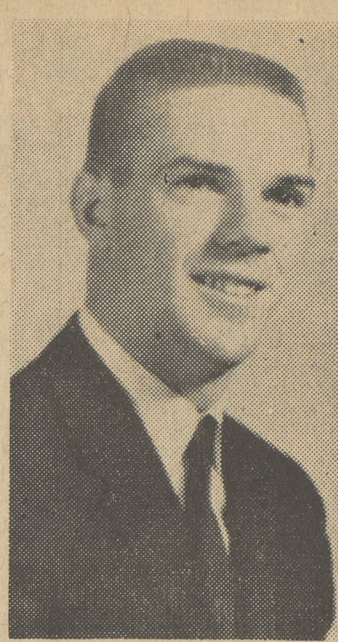

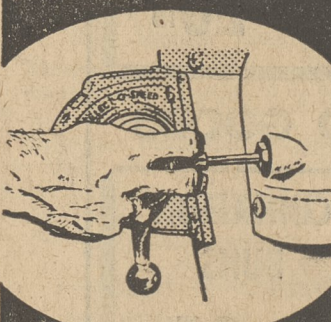

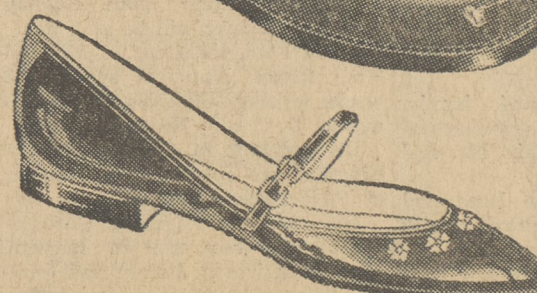
