Helen and Bill Lamb of "The Lamp House" will again give a lovely old lamp, with shade painted by Helen Lamb.

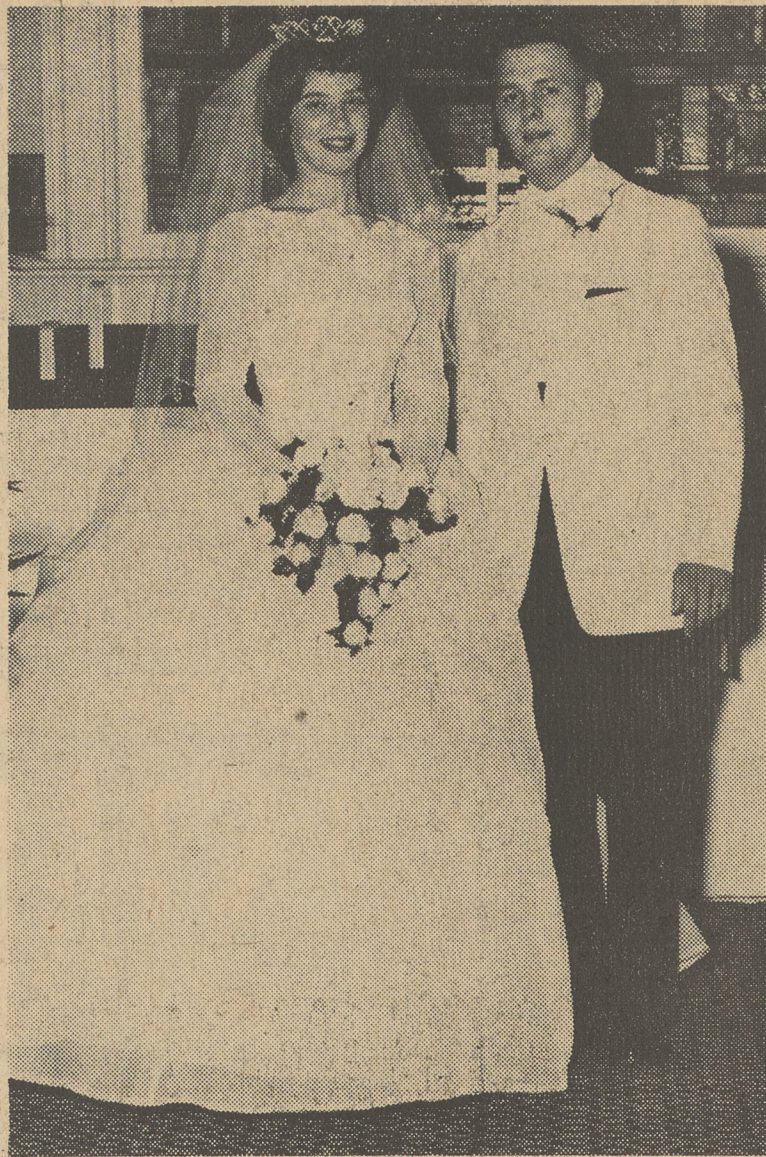
Helen Gross has finished decorating the bench to be chanced off and I hear it looks beautiful. Be sure to see any member of the Antiques Committee and buy some chances on it.
