He belonged to First Presbyterian Church, and Masonic bodies.

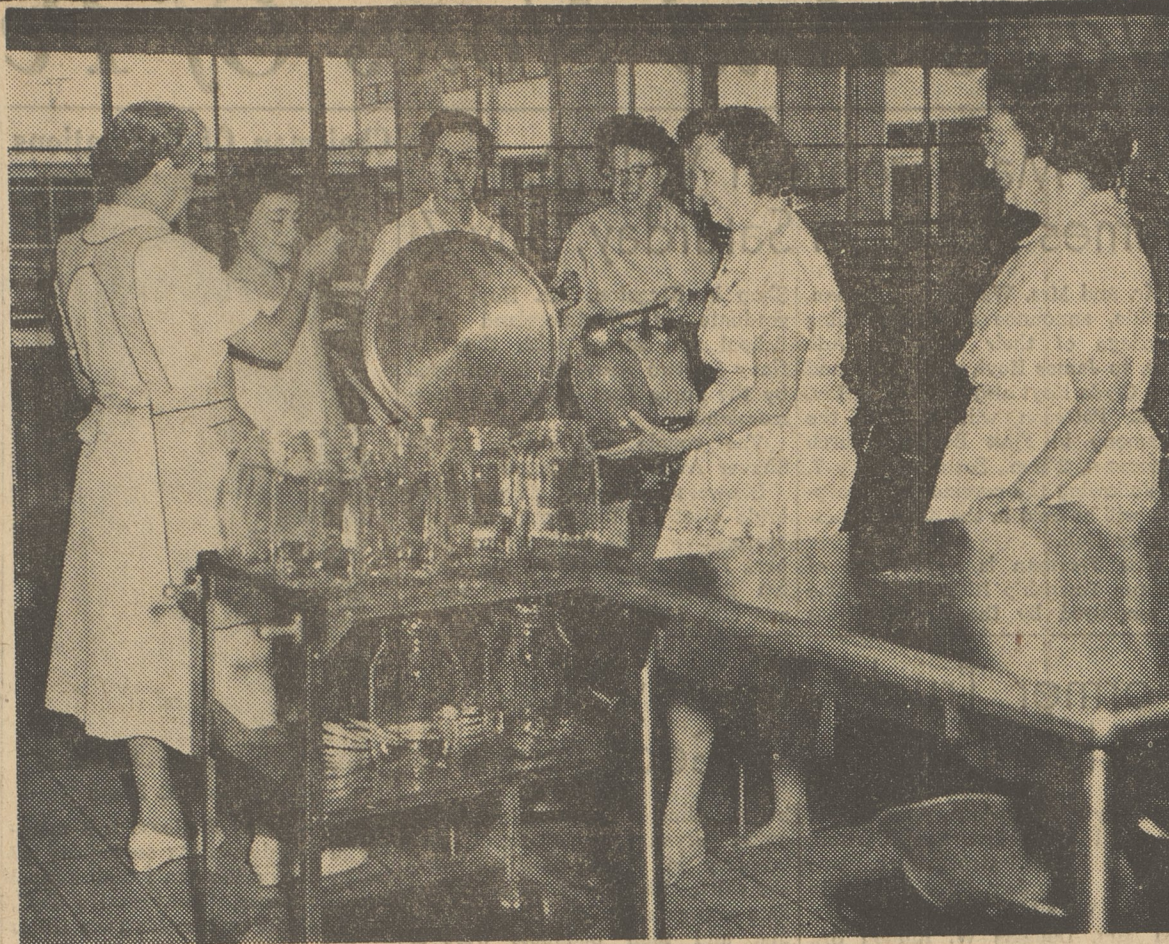
