

Summer Music Program Starts Monday, Continues Six Weeks

Summer music program sponsored by Dallas Schools will begin on Monday, July 9, and continue each day for six weeks.

Dallas Elementary School: 1:00, seventh to twelfth grade, band rehearsal; 2:00, Elementary Band rehearsal.

All twirlers will meet on Tuesday and Thursday according to this schedule: 9:00, Dallas Junior High; 10:30, Dallas Elementary; and 1:00 at Westmoreland. All twirlers from first grade on are invited to be a part of this program.

This summer school is open to any player or twirler who wishes to participate, regardless of what school they might attend during the

regular school term. At the close of the summer program an out-door concert will be held to which the public is invited. All students who participate in the summer school will take part. A good attendance throughout the summer will produce the best possible program.

Twirling classes will be taught by Mrs. Florence Sherwood, music instructor in the Dallas Evening School, and Elaine Kozemchak, senior at Wilkes College.

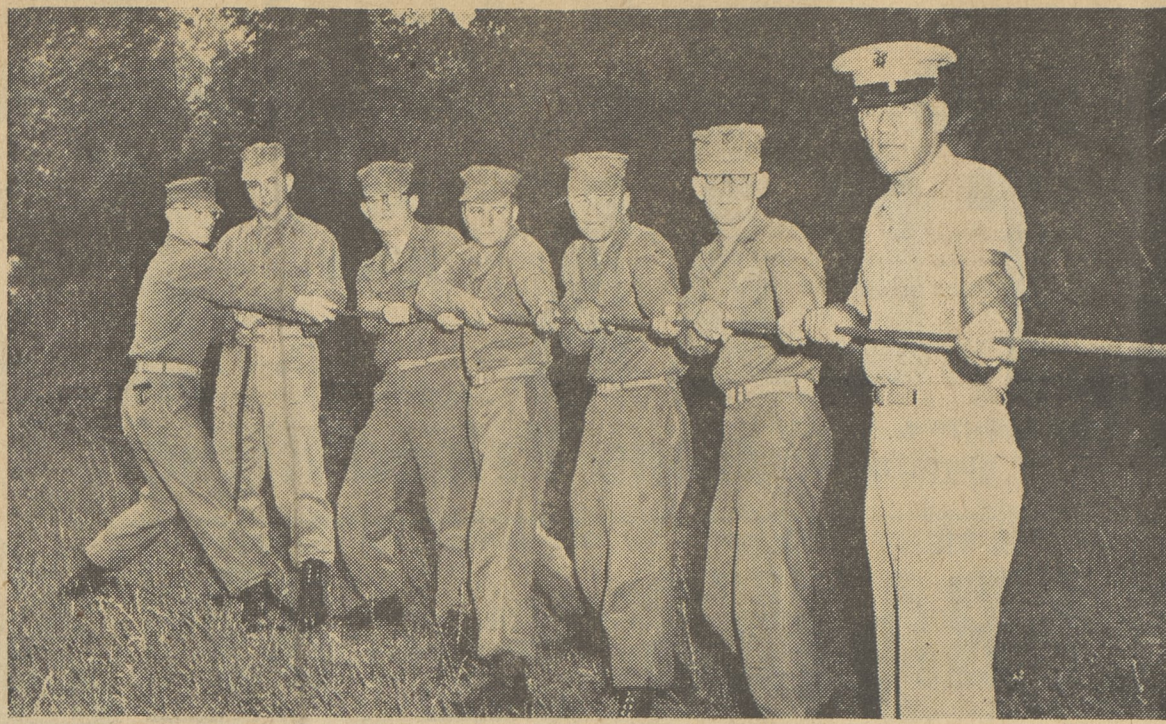
Penn State Graduate With Proctor & Gamble

College Chemistry Head Takes Advanced Work At Rensselaer

TROY, N.Y.—Sister M. Crescentia O'Conner, R.S.M. chairman of chemistry department at College Misericordia, is one of twelve college and university teachers participating in an eight-week program of instrumental methods analysis at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. The program is sponsored by the National Science Foundation.

Sister O'Conner who lives at Dallas, will participate in an intensive two week lecture and laboratory work in instrumental analysis. Upon completing this phase of the course, she will participate in a six-week research program. The research work is designed to enable her to become more familiar with useful research techniques in a particular phase of instrumental analysis.

The course started June 25 and will continue through August 17. Some of the subjects to be covered include absorption spectroscopy in ultraviolet, visible and infrared regions, Raman spectroscopy in gas chromatography, nuclear magnetic resonance, X-ray analysis, mass spec-

trometry and dectrometric methods.

Hong Kong, B.C.C. (PHTNC)—Donald F. Hazeltine, aviation fire control technician commissaryman, USN, son of Mrs. Arline Hazeltine of Park Street, Dallas, serving with Fighter Squadron 151 aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Coral Sea, recently helped to make life for the Chinese refugees streaming into Hong Kong a little more pleasant.

During a recent visit to the British colony the crew of the mighty carrier and members of various detachments aboard donated blood to the British Red Cross to be used by needy refugees. In addition money was collected with which to buy food for them.

The Hong Kong assistance marked the second time in past weeks that men aboard the ship had answered the call for help. While in Kobe, Japan, the crew also gave blood to help victims of a recent train disaster near Tokyo.

The 63,000-ton carrier is presently operating in the South China Sea as a unit of the Seventh Fleet. She is scheduled to return to the U. S. in July.
