**Final Figures Of  
Library Auction  
Show 16,000 Net**

**Chairmen Given Final  
Reports At Pot-Luck  
Dinner At Demmy's**

Final reports on the Sixteenth Annual Library Auction were submitted Friday evening by committee chairmen, who met for a potluck supper at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Demmy. Atty Robert Fleming, next year's auction chairman, appealed to chairmen to submit any constructive suggestions for next year's Library Auction. He stated that this year's chairman, Dick Demmy, had done an outstanding job.

Budget for maintenance of the Library next year, \$18,900, will be largely financed by this year's auction, with its estimated net of something over \$16,000. The auction is the mainstay of support for the Library. Last year, \$4,500 was spent for capital improvements, including renovation of the second floor of the library, quarters once used by former librarian Miss Miriam Lathrop; new roof and new furnace.

The Library gets very little support except for the auction. Dallas Schools contributed \$1,000 annually; Lake-Lehman schools \$500; and approximately \$500 in private donations. Major items of operation are salaries for librarians. The State's donation of \$2,000 is earmarked for books, and the State specifies the kind of books acceptable. None of the amount can be used for maintenance or salaries.

Sales over the block amounted to \$10,554. The refreshment stand netted over \$2,000, serving more food than ever before. New Goods valued at \$10,954 went at bargain rates for the most part.

Antiques accounted for nearly \$3,600, with \$180 of this amount realized from sales over the table, many of the items garnered from Odds and Ends. The Pennsylvania Dutch decorated settee was a strong drawing card. Chances on Mrs. Arthur Newman's doll brought over \$78, and dolls brought a profit of \$194.95.

Monogramming of handkerchieves, an innovation, brought \$74.35, due to Mrs. Florence Weinberg's efforts on Saturday.

Baked goods brought \$367.50. Book Booth profits were up, \$636.73. Plants and Produce netted \$285.32. Home-made candy, a popular item where supply never meets demand, netted \$475.81.

Odds and Ends made \$797.10. Parking brought \$85.90.

Kick-Off Dinner netted \$128.86; chicken barbecue dinner around \$500. Auto chances grossed \$2,666. Arts and Crafts made \$492.

Pony rides brought in \$58. The Fun Booth made \$332.90. Ziba Smith in reporting for the Grounds Committee, said his men started working June 16, and worked week nights right up until the Fourth of July. After the auction was over, they worked in reverse, stowing tents away in dry trash cans for next year's auction, dismantling tent frames, prundling the endless conglomeration to the second floor of the Barn. Key Club members assisted. This is the fourth year that the auction has been under its own canvas.

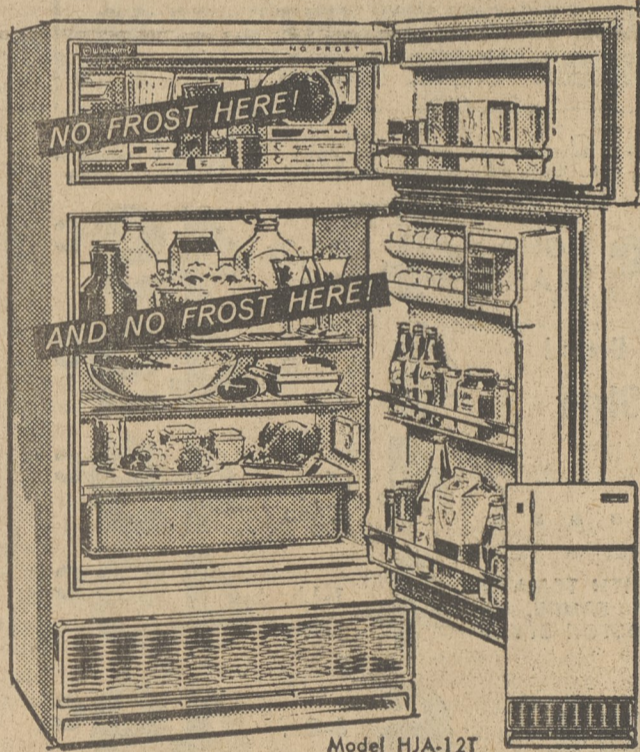
