

### Tunkhannock Diagnostic Laboratory Is Performing Invaluable Service

A new milestone of service for the people of twelve Northeastern Pennsylvania counties was reached recently at the state's Regional Diagnostic Laboratory at Tunkhannock.

On July 30, the Tunkhannock laboratory listed its 10,000th case entry representing the number of persons who have brought poultry and other farm animals to the center for diagnosis. The total number of diagnoses has exceeded 22,000.

The Tunkhannock laboratory was opened July 1, 1954. Since then it has helped to guard and maintain

the health of Northeastern Pennsylvania's herds and flocks. Originally set up for poultry diagnostic work, the laboratory in the past three years has expanded its services to include all farm animals. The work includes brucellosis blood tests for the showing and sale of animals and for emergency purposes.

Increasing use is being made of the laboratory facilities each year. During July, 1962, detailed autopsies and associated laboratory tests were performed on over 500 poultry specimens and 42 animal specimens.

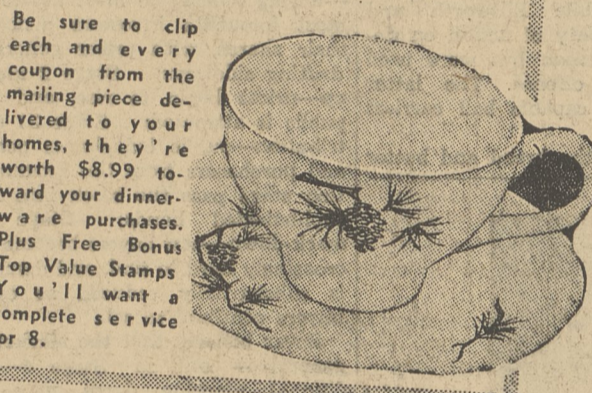
