Book-keeping has been dropped, as there is greater demand for work with office machines.

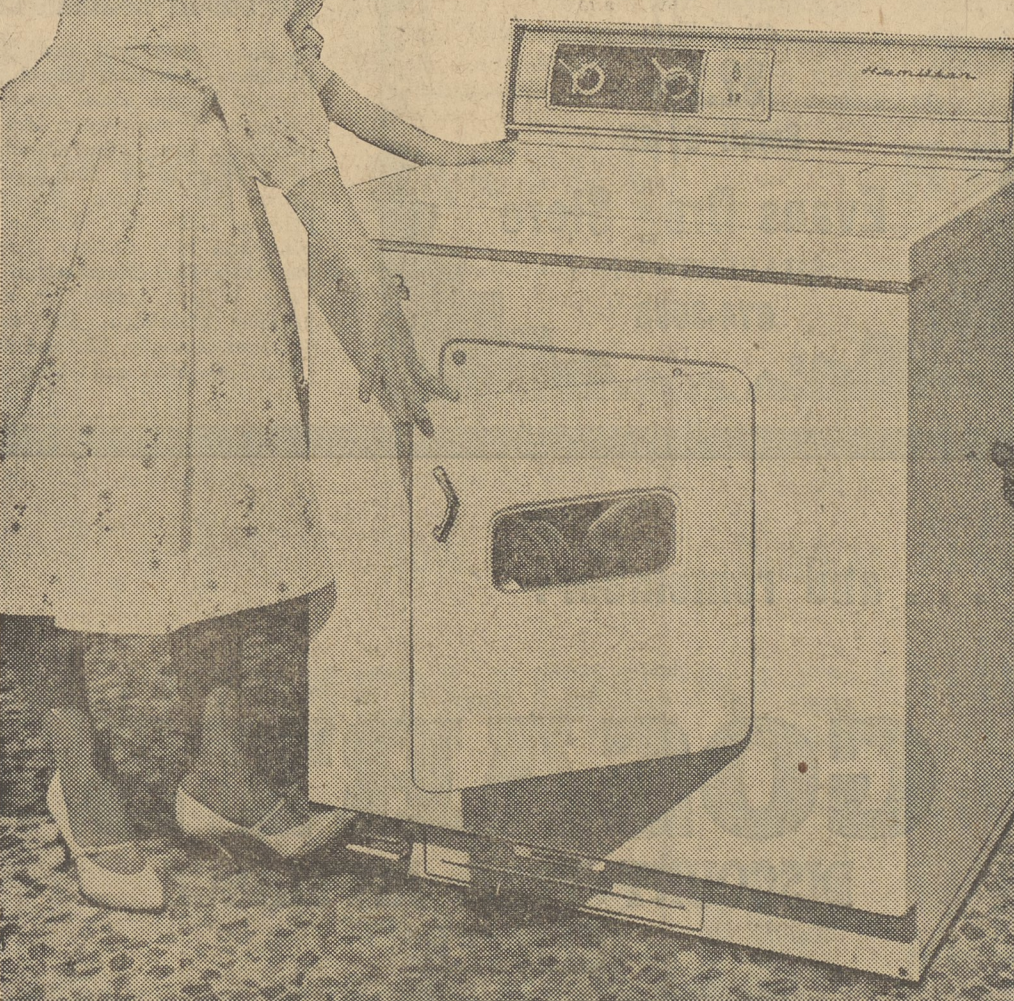

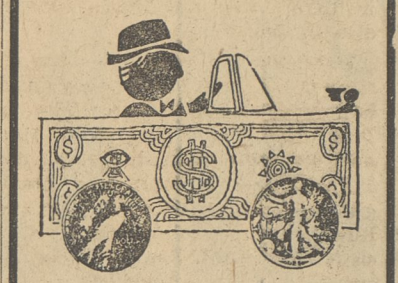

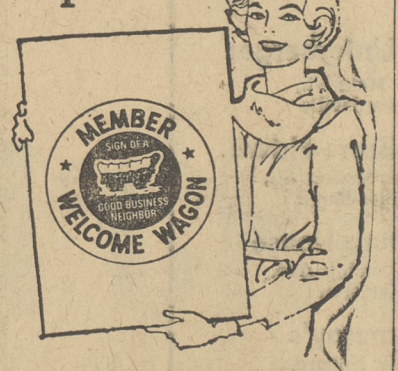
