Weekly high honors go to Steve Bonomo with 656 series rolled in Major League Friday and to Don Bolton, who hit a big 262 game in Back Mt. Neighborhood League Thursday. Grace Sickler was tops for the girls when she topped 210 in one game for Country League last Tuesday and Helen Bonomo starred with the 558 series she piled up in Imperialettes League Friday.

Don's big game broke the record set by Nick Stredny several weeks ago, but Nick's high 669 series is still on top. Evelyn Roberts still holds top game of 217 but Helen Bonomo's beautiful series knocked out Ginger Gosart's 544.

**MAJOR LEAGUE**

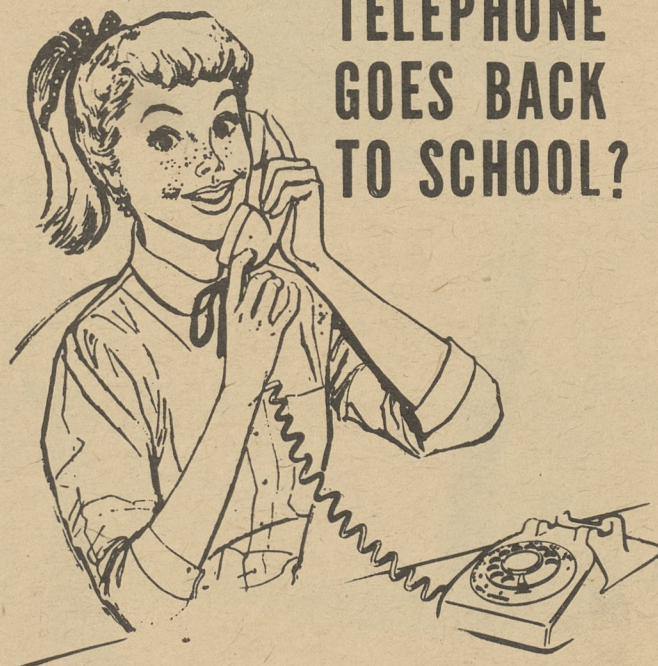
