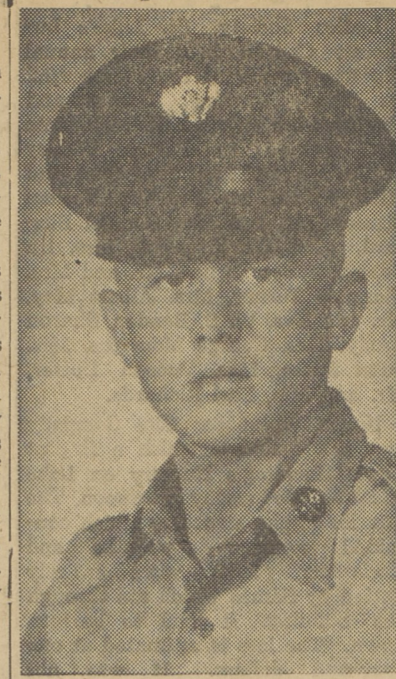

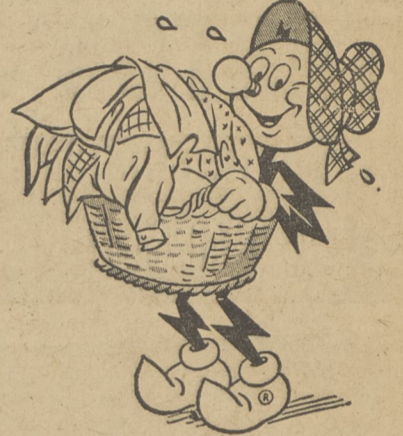
Schoonover To Spend Christmas In Hospital

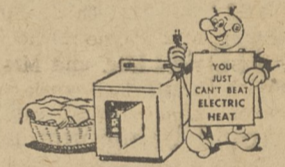

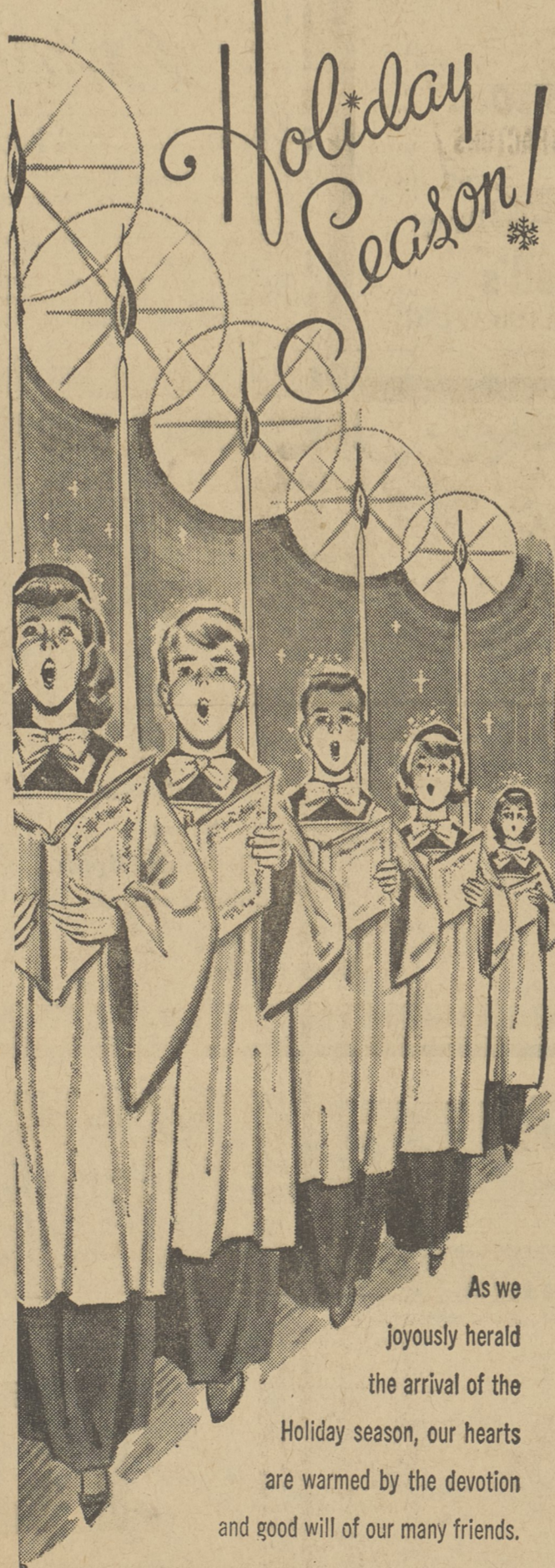
