

### Mosier Near 1,500-Point Mark In Career Scoring

Clark Mosier, the Westmoreland High Grad who went on to become the highest scoring player in Susquehanna University's basketball history, should top the 1,500 point mark in S. U.'s next game—an important Middle Atlantic Conference clash with Albright College Saturday at Reading.

Although he has not been as impressive this season as he was in 1961-62, Mosier still can boast of a varsity total of 1,497 points. Since the season is young he has a chance to reach the coveted 2,000 mark before closing out his Susquehanna career.

The 6-2 Dallas senior blistered the nets for an average of 28.3 points per game last season to rank ninth in the nation among small-college scorers. Tossing in 47 against Eliz-

abethtown in the final game, he ran his three-year total to 1,401.

Hampered by minor physical ailments this season, he has scored 96 points in S. U.'s six contests to date for an average of 16 per game.

Susquehanna coach John Barr is hoping that Mosier will regain his old form for the Albright clash, which could have a lot to do with determining the eventual champion in the MAC's Northern, College Division.

Always a contender, Albright has a 2-0 record in MAC play, compared to S. U.'s 2-1. In a pre-season poll of the coaches, Susquehanna was picked as the favorite for the division championship, but the Crusaders were upset by Wagner 65-60 in their last game.

### Disaster Fund

In response to the thousands of inquiries from throughout the United States, the Uniontown Morning Herald and Evening Standard today established a "Robena No. 3 Disaster Trust Fund" to provide for the education, health and welfare of dependents of the miners who lost their lives Thursday, Dec. 6, in the explosion at the Robena mine.

Immediate steps are being taken, according to S. W. Calkins, president of the Uniontown newspapers, publishers of the Herald and Standard, to incorporate the organization as a non-profit charitable corporation. It will be administered as a trust by a board of trustees composed of prominent citizens in the Uniontown area. Names of the trustees will be announced shortly, Mr. Calkins said.

Inquiries have been received from throughout the United States from persons expressing a desire to contribute to such a fund, Mr. Calkins said.

Cash contributions will be held in trust by the fund, and will be used to provide for the education, health and welfare of the children of the miners who lost their lives. In addition, other needs of the families will be met as required.

### Piano Contest For Students

A competition in piano, open to all students of Luzerne County public and private senior high schools, who are currently studying piano will be held at the Music Department of Wilkes College, February 9.

Competition will be judged by the Wilkes College Music Faculty. The award to the winning pianist will be a \$200 scholarship for further study in any college or conservatory of like grade, and the opportunity of performing his or her winning selection at the Carpenter Memorial Concert, to be held March 11, 1963, in First Methodist Church, Wilkes-Barre.

Pupils of the tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades of all county high schools are eligible to enter this competition.

Application blanks, as well as any additional information for the auditions, may be secured from the instrumental supervisor in each school, or from the secretary of the Luzerne County Public Schools Instrumental Music Teachers' Association, Agnesino Primatic, G.A.R. High School, Wilkes-Barre.

The scholarship award is being given by the donors of the Carpenter Memorial Foundation of Wilkes-Barre, in conjunction with the Luzerne County Public Schools Instrumental Music Teachers' Association and the Music Department of Wilkes College.

Announcement of the coming auditions has been sent to all instrumental teachers in Luzerne County. The name of the winner of the scholarship award will be announced one week prior to the 1963 Carpenter Memorial Concert which will be presented March 11 in First Methodist Church, Wilkes-Barre. Winning pianist will be presented and perform with artists from the New York concert stage.

The Carpenter Foundation, which is sponsoring this annual concert, has for one of its stated purposes the encouragement of local musicians. The scholarship award was made available by the donors of the Foundation as a result of the enthusiastic interest aroused throughout county high school music circles, by the all-Luzerne County Scholastic Brass Choir. This organization appeared initially with the New York Brass Quintet at the 1962 Carpenter Memorial Concert last Spring.
