






Pupils of the tenth, eleventh and twelfth grades of all county high schools are eligible to enter this competition.

Application blanks, as well as any additional information for the auditions, may be secured from the instrumental supervisor in each school, or from the secretary of the Lu-erne County Public Schools Instrumental Music Teachers' Association, 'Agesino Primatic, G.A.R. High School, Wilkes-Barre.

The scholarship award is being given by the donors of the Carpenter Memorial Foundation of Wilkes-Barre, in conjunction with the Luzerne County Public Schools Instrumental Music Teachers' Association and the Music Department of Wilkes College.

Announcement of the coming auditions has been sent to all instrumental teachers in Luzerne County. The name of the winner of the scholarship award will be announced one week prior to the 1963 Carpenter Memorial Concert which will be presented March 11 in First Methodist Church, Wilkes-Barre. Winning pianist will be presented and perform with artists from the New York concert stage.

The Carpenter Foundation, which is sponsoring this annual concert, has for one of its stated purposes the encouragement of local musicians. The scholarship award wa made available by the donors of the Foundation as a result of the enthusiastic interest aroused throughout county high school music circles, by the all-Luzerne County Scholastic Brass Choir. This organization appeared initially with the New York Brass Quintet at the 1962 Carpenter Memorial Concert last Spring.
