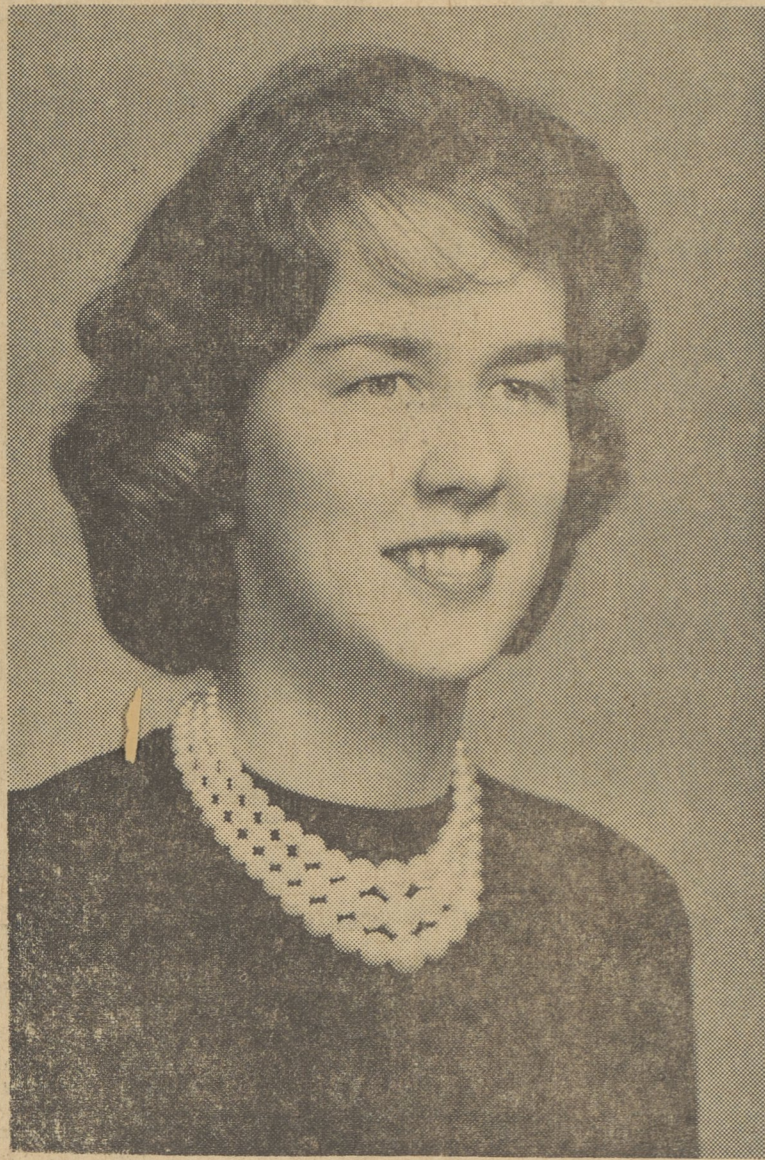
Charles Michel Plans To Retire From Linear

Mrs. Anderson is most proud of the fact that of the six children born to her parents, all are alive and in good health. This she attributes to clean living.

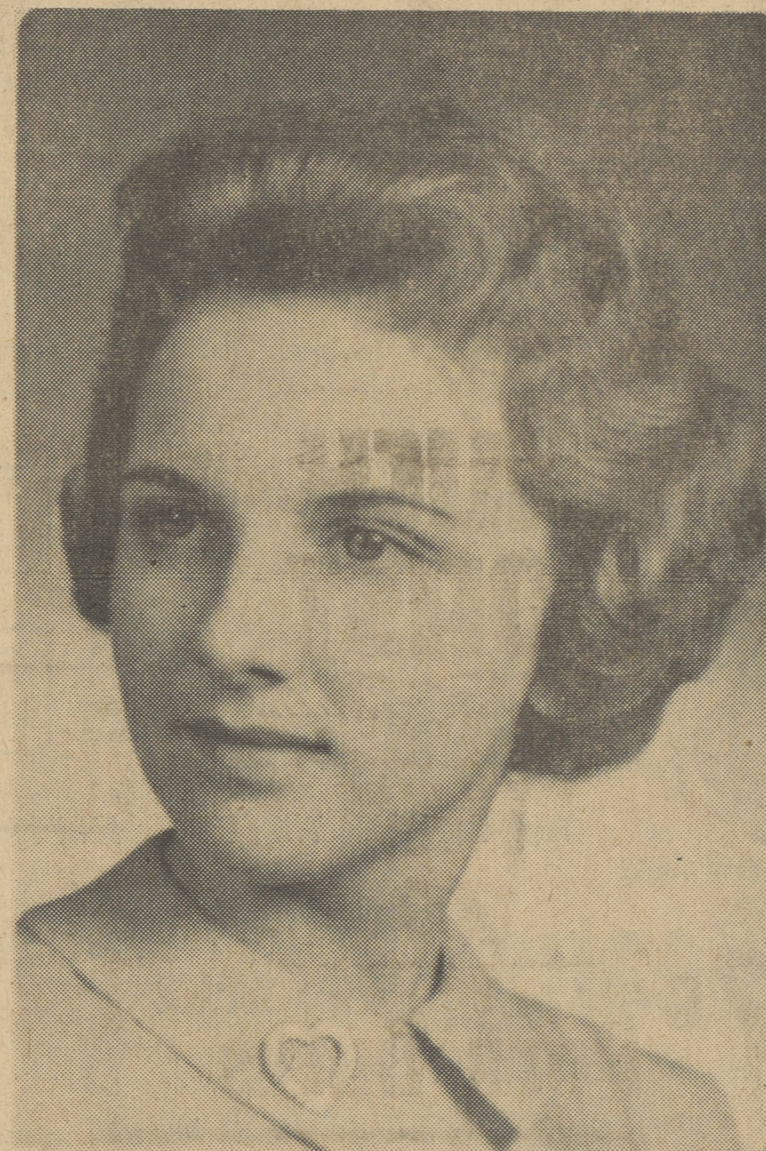
