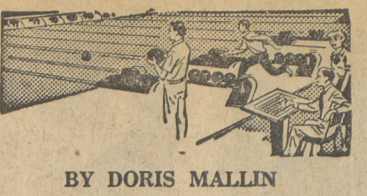
Young Oldtimers

Mrs. Dierolf is the former Francis Mericle, daughter of Mr. and James Mericle, Beech Street, Shavertown.

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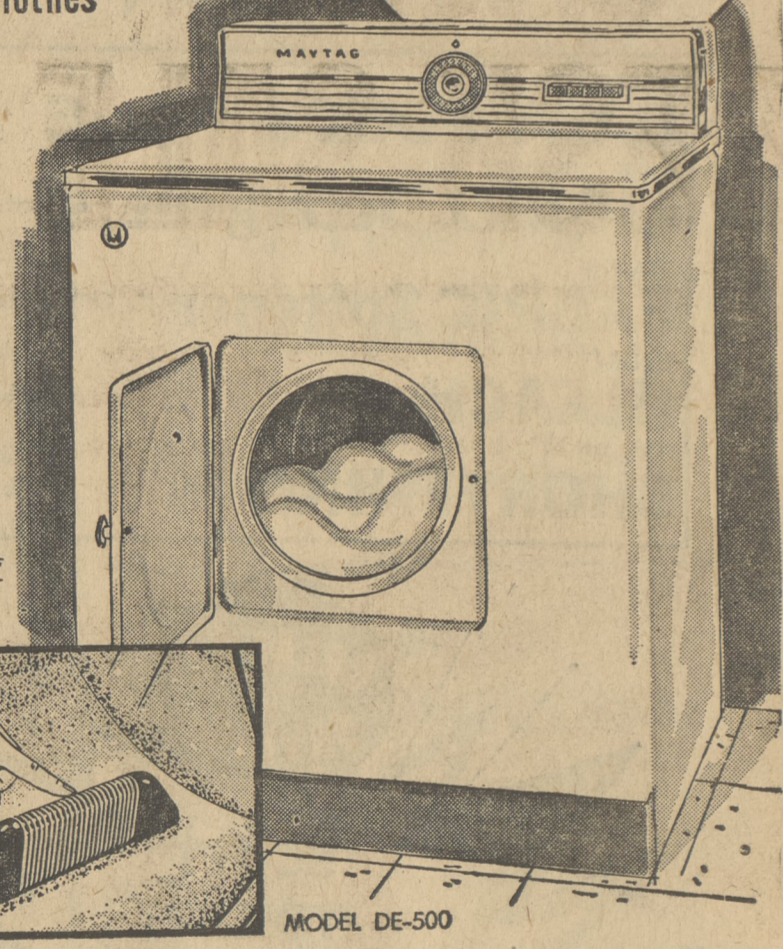
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
