The Trade Union Program has been in continuous operation since 1942 when it was undertaken at the suggestion of union officials who felt there was a need for emphasis on executive and administrative responsibilities in the unions. The 13-week course, dealing with actual policy questions and decisions which confront the union leader, is designed to extend to the trade unions the same basic training long offered to men entering business administration. It is conducted jointly by Harvard's Littauer School of Public Administration, Department of Economics, Graduate School of Business Administration, and Law School.

Fourteen students were taken into the society last June, the five with highest averages as charter members.

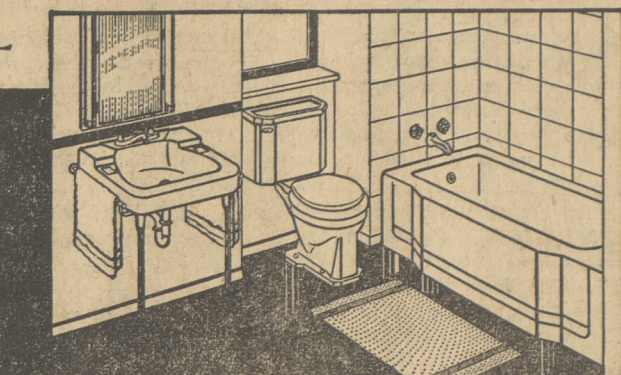
Although it might appear that the 26 just installed is a large number, it is less than half of the ten per cent of the student body which could have been eligible.

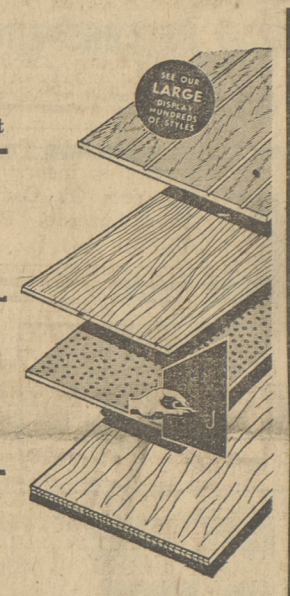
