
To qualify for the award, Hillside had to meet strict requirements in all phases of dairy cattle breeding and management, including production, type improvement, herd health and development of home-bred

A small brace will be forged to insure a snug clamp-in in the

The stretcher, similar to that in Tunkhannock ambulance, is the latest device of its kind, insuring passenger a smooth transit from stretcher to hospital bed or table. One man can raise and lower the occupied stretcher.

Two hours before his tragic end Lt. Col. Hanna had stopped at Forty Fort Ice Cream Store, Fernbrook where he ate a sandwich, and asked Manager Bill DiBuo and Assistant Chief of Police Stanley Gardiner directions to Wilkes-Barre.
