According to a survey just completed by the Achievement Awards program, 86% of the institutions polled take into consideration the award announcement when inviting, accepting, and recommending program finalists for scholarship aid.

Reports of finalists from previous years show that 99% of them attend colleges of their choice and more than 70% of the total students honored receive scholarship aid averaging almost \$1000 per year.

Tyler Memorial Hospital is launching its building campaign, according to announcement by Leroy B. Hemmelwright, president.

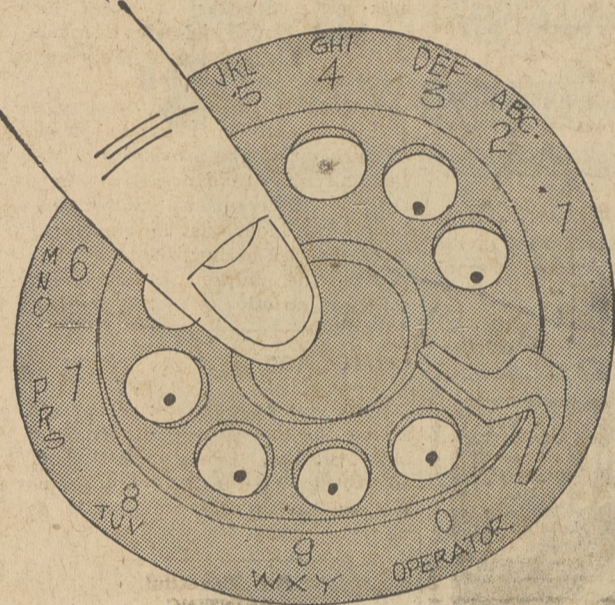
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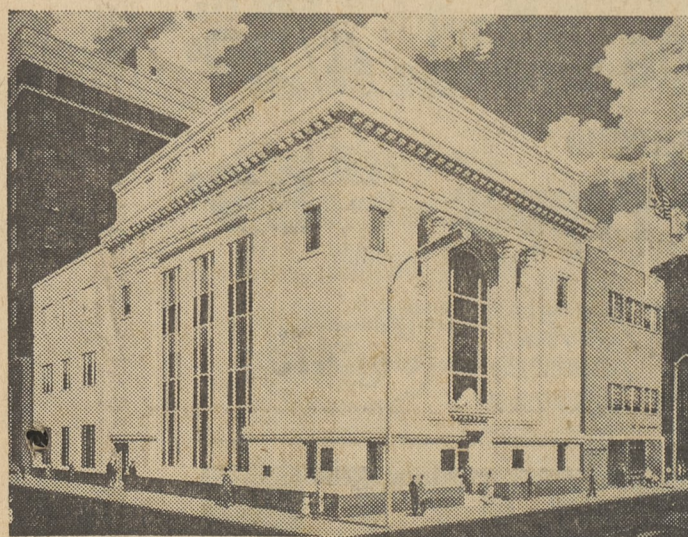
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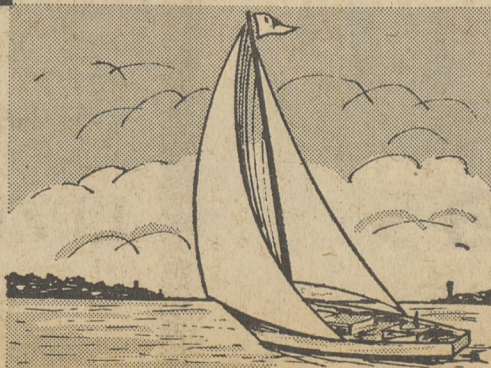


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
