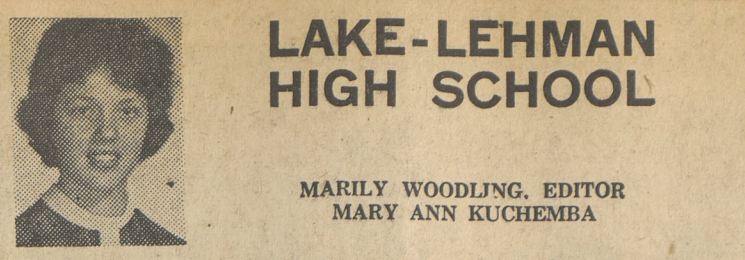

Selected For Research Class

Ulinoski Is Among Twenty-Five Chosen

Joseph Frank Ulinoski, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Ulinoski, 37 Luzerne Avenue, a junior at Dallas Senior High School, has been selected to participate in a National Science Foundation seminar in mathematics at Lehigh University June 20 through July 31.

He is one of twenty-five high school students picked for the six-week junior research seminar, according to announcement by Dr. Albert Wiensky, professor of mathematics and seminar director.

The program, conducted by the university department of mathematics, will give these superior mathematics students an opportunity to use their own initiative and skill in solving problems under the guidance of the staff.

The seminar meets five mornings a week for six weeks and will consist of lectures and directed research in mathematics. This is the fourth consecutive of these tuition-free summer programs to be held on Lehigh campus.
