Dandelions have burst out in all their glory on most of lawns in Chase Manor, giving the owners of same plenty of work to uproot them.

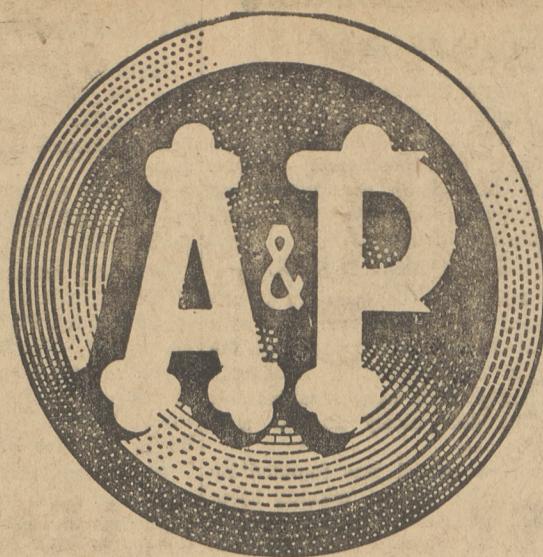

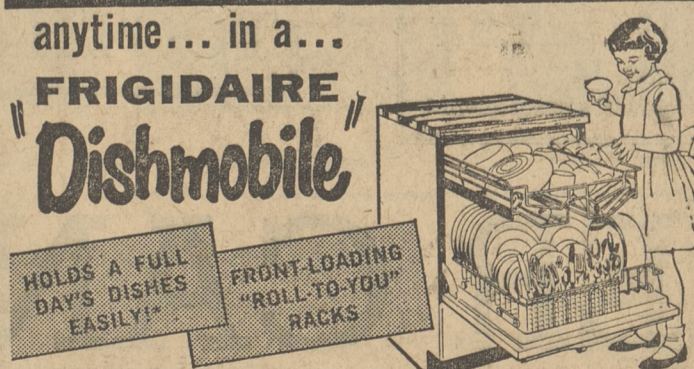
