Mildred Krum and Priscilla Krum were in charge of the dining room. Alice Daniels and Audrey Earl were co-chairmen of the kitchen.

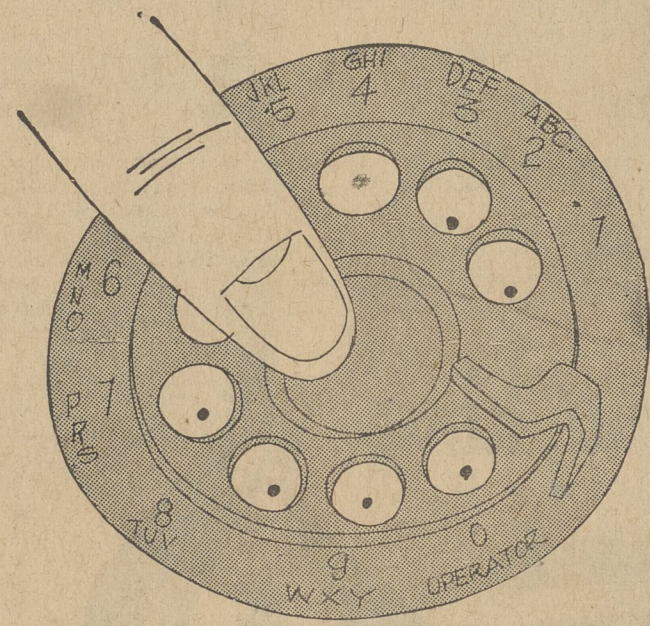

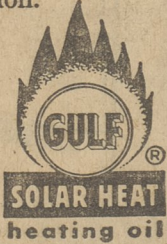
