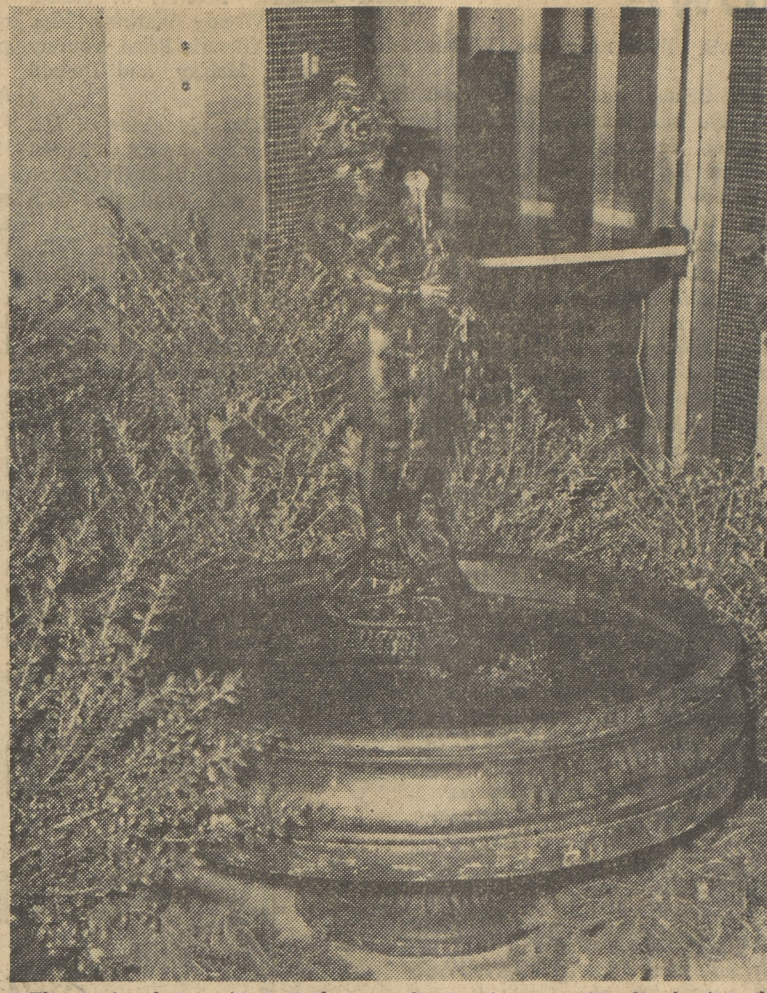
Donald W. Belles Finishes At Maryland
