## Lake Police Nab Juvenile Groups

Harveys Lake police turned over to proper authorities several groups of juveniles who committed delinquent acts in the last month.

Four Kingston boys, three 14 and one 13, were referred to juvenile authorities, and subsequently released when the owner of a motorboat they took for a ride Monday afternoon decided not to press charges. Boathouse was at Point Breeze, Pole 236.

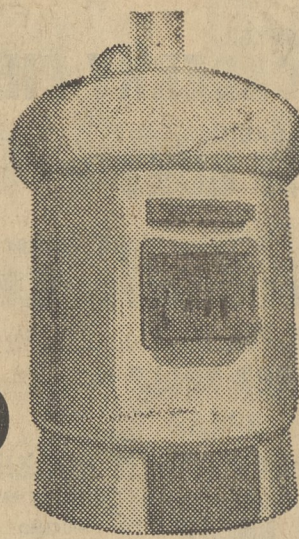

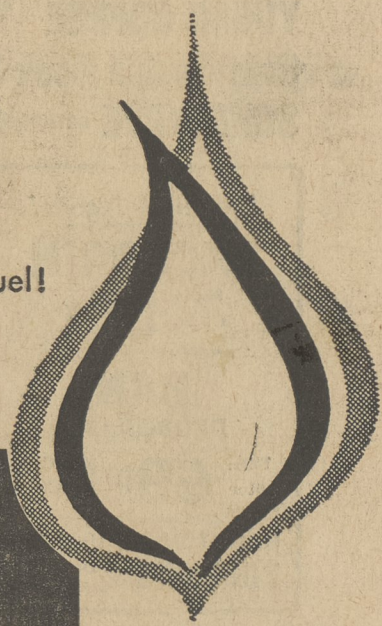
