Cloverleaf 4-H Club met recently at the home of leaders Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Scott.

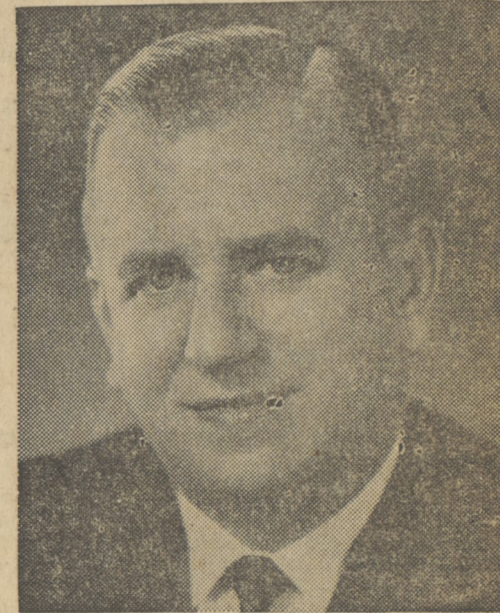
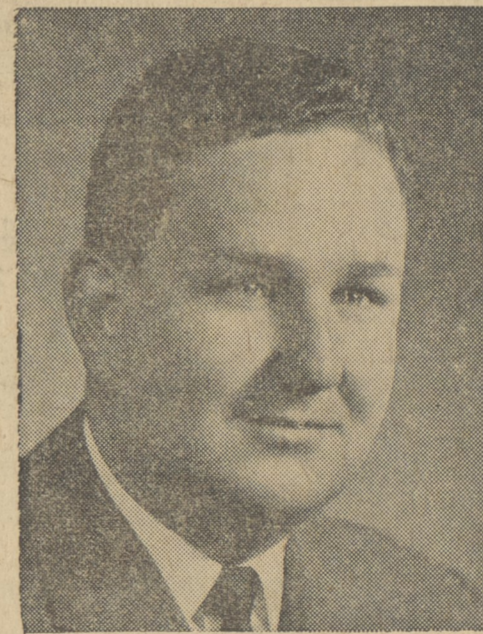
Mrs. Scott announced that the 4-H county picnic would be held at Moyer's Grove.
