Their home is near the base at Daleville, Alabama. They will be returning home July 24th.

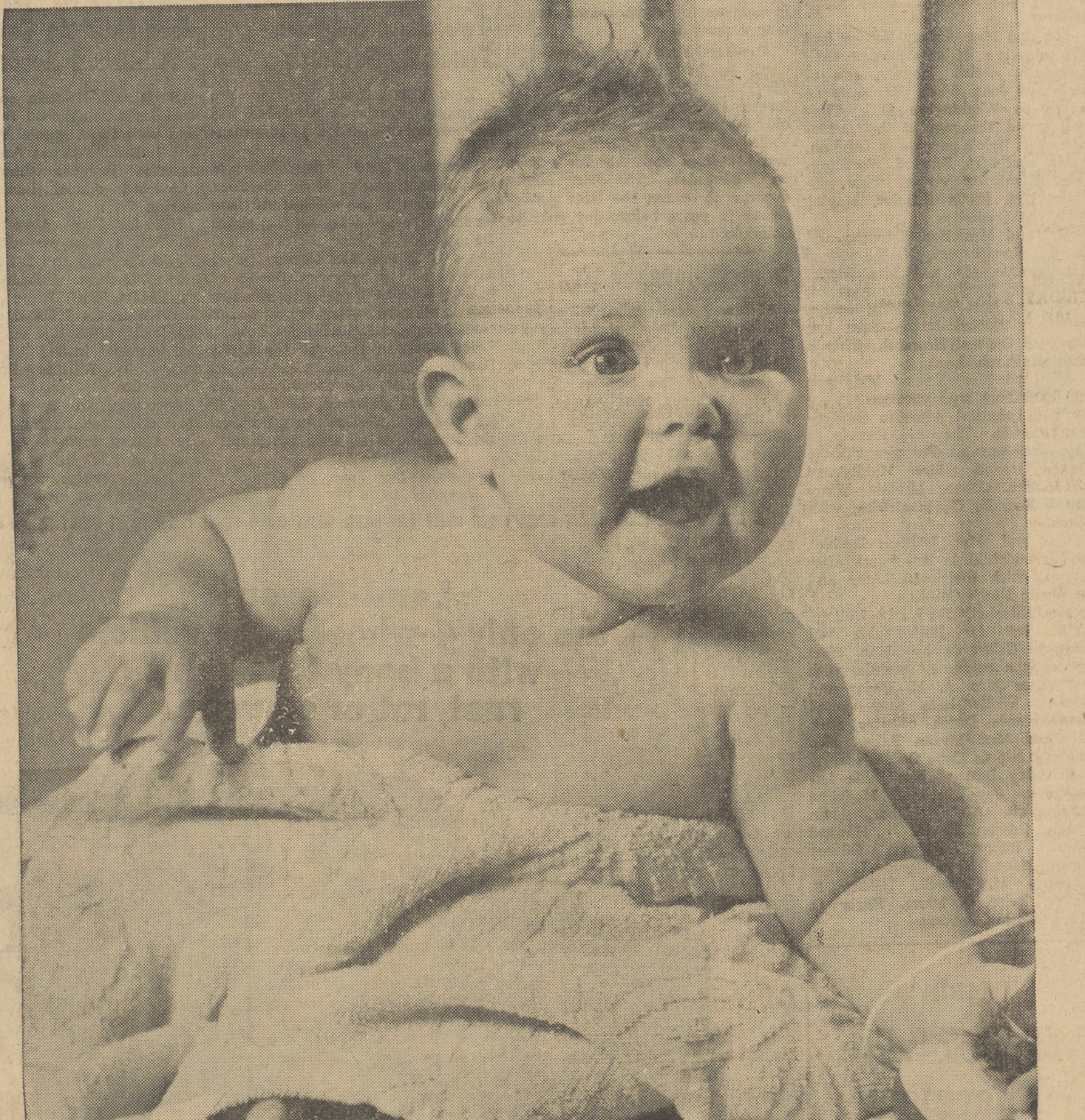
