Entertainment and various athletic events will be held during the day. Door prizes will be awarded.

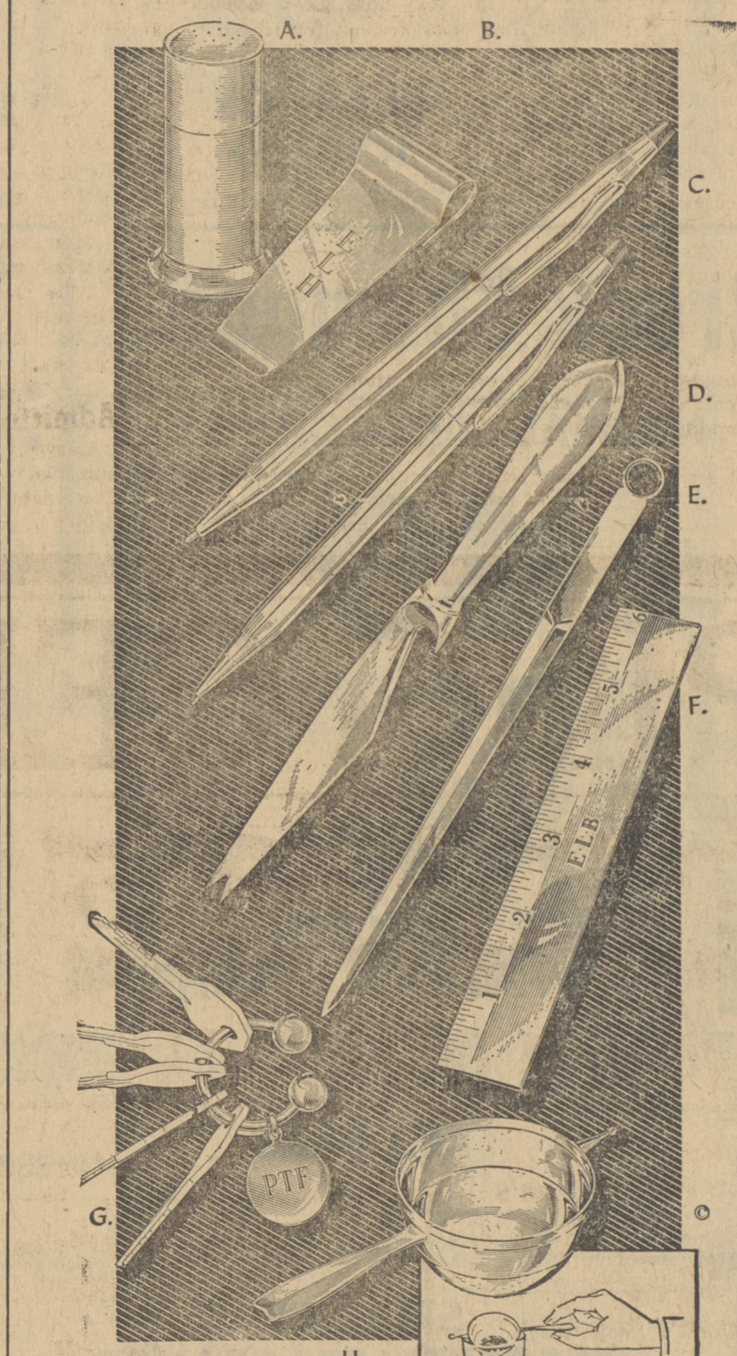
Little Hobby Club Holds Hobo Picnic At Rozelles
