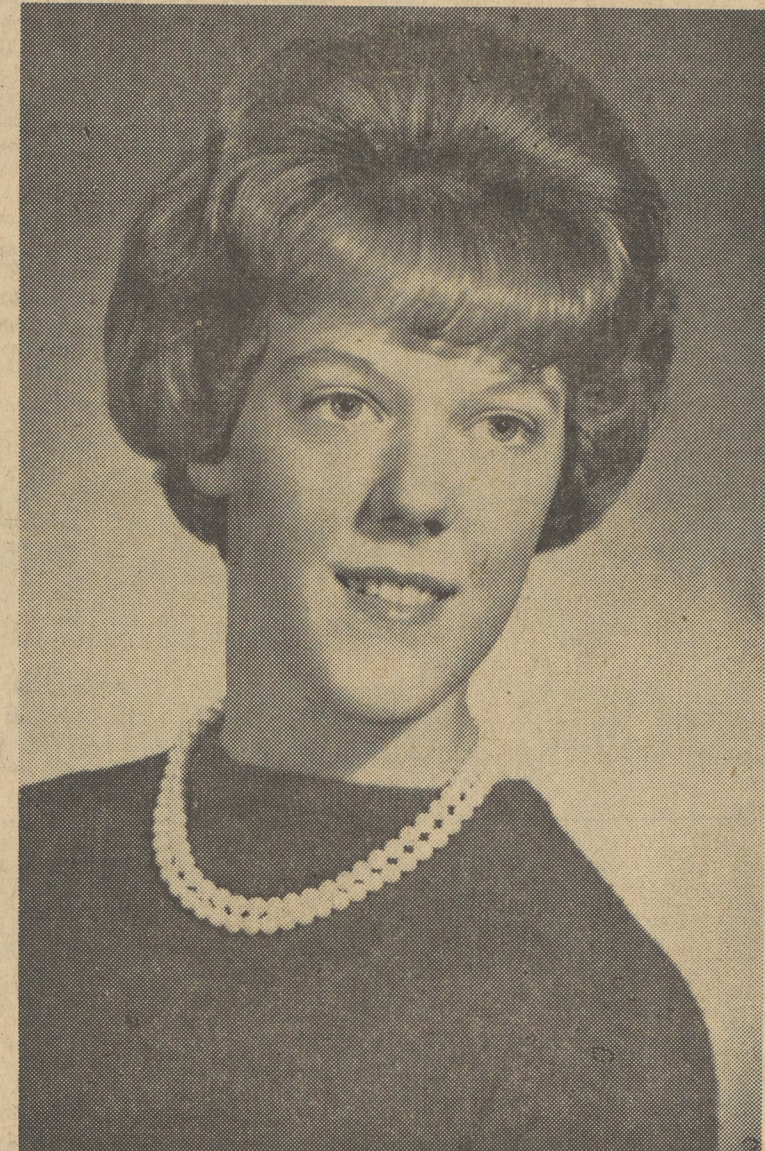

Schneiders Visit New England States

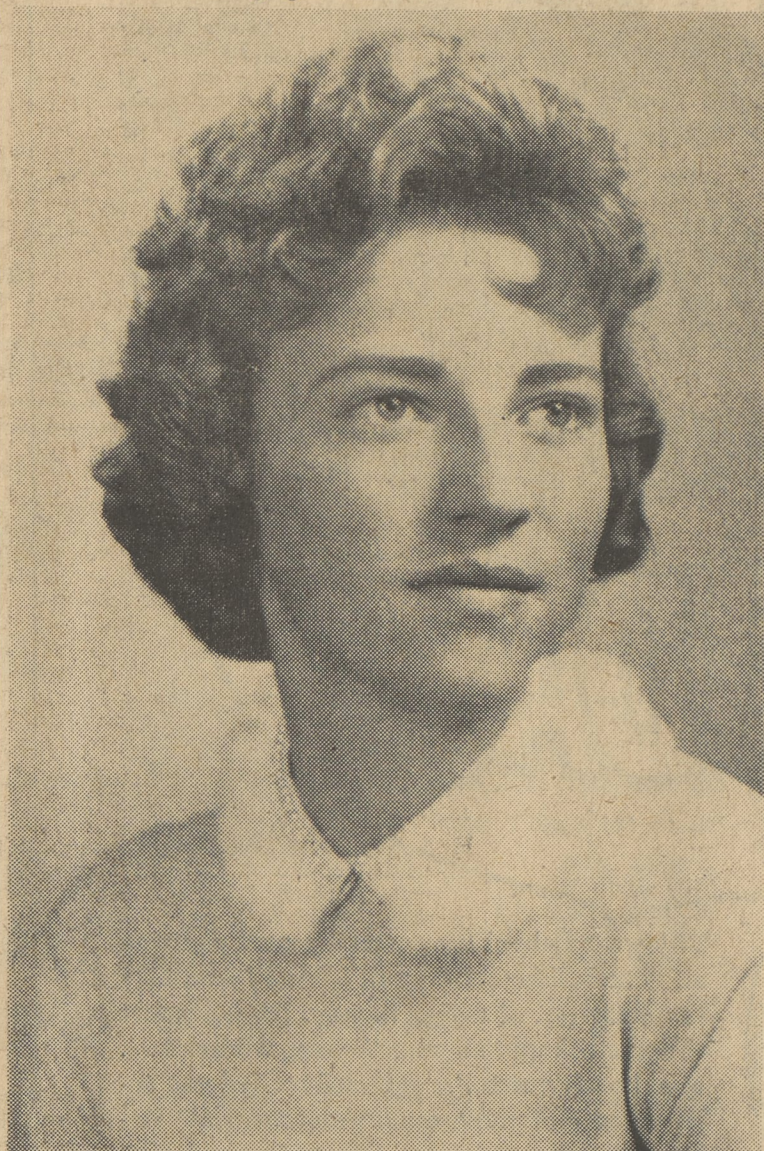
