"Linda" was obedience trained in classes sponsored by the Anthracite Dog Training Club; she received companion dog excellent title award by American Kennel Club in 1961 and 1962. Her sire is International champion Roadcoach Roadster; her dam, Blue Flame of Diamond Acres.

"Linda" retired this year to rear a litter of puppies for the Collett's grandson, Harry Goeringer III. The

puppies shown here are three of her litter of six. Tiny Tears of Black Diamonds belongs to Debbie Rogers; Jack of Black Diamonds and Black Diamond Tiger have adopted Harry as their master. Mr. Ellis came to America from Java, and told of his homeland and of all his experiences in the Far East.

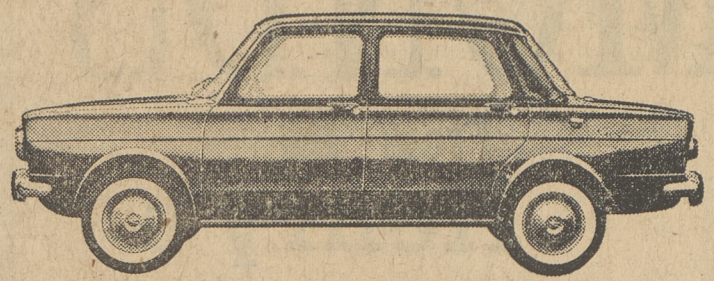

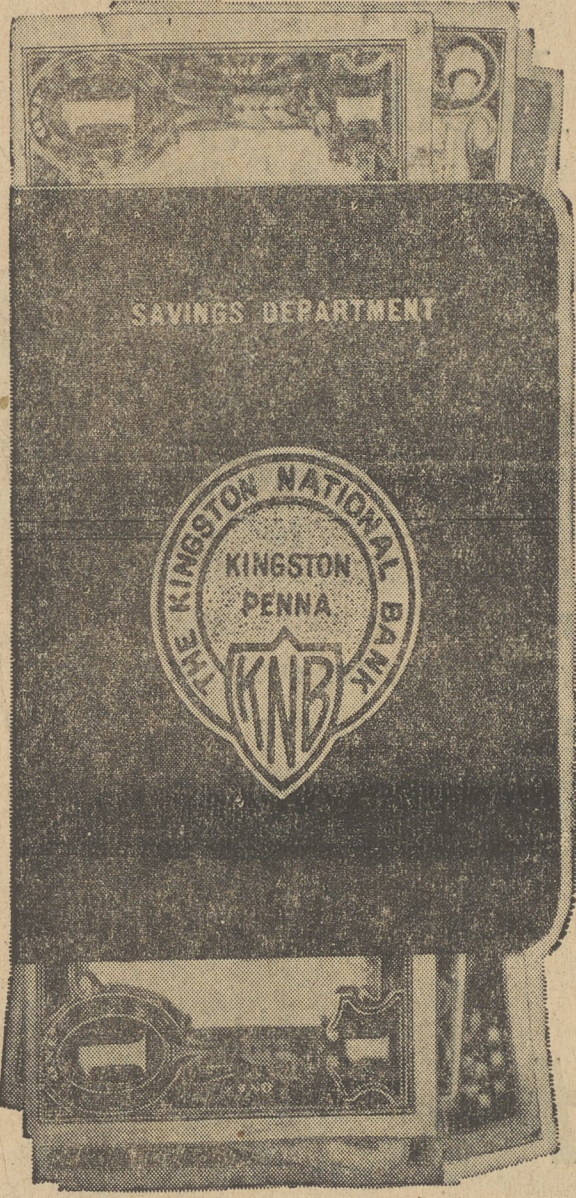
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Cloverleaf Club Meets Plans Winter Program
