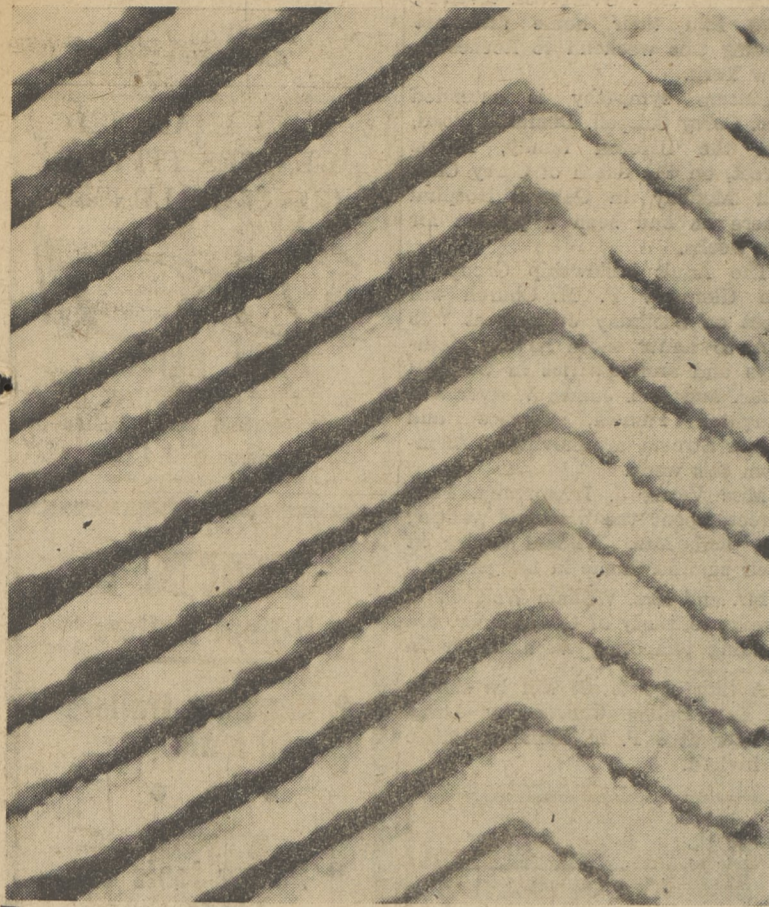

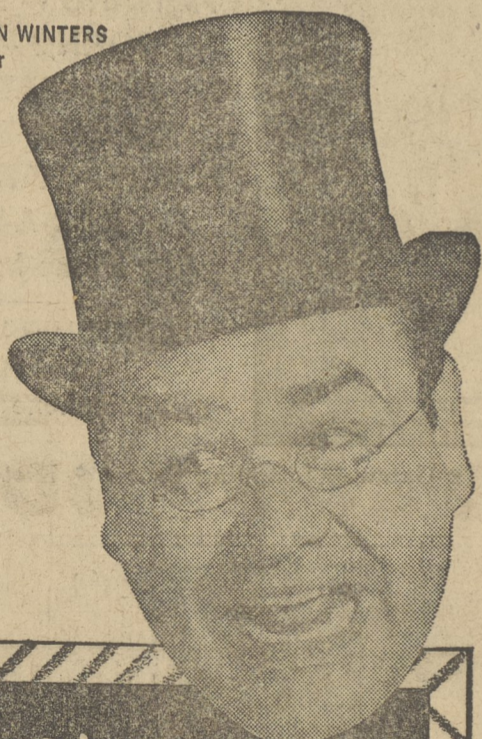

Bob and Bill Johnson spend their Saturday mornings earning their "God and Country" badge. Good going, fellows!

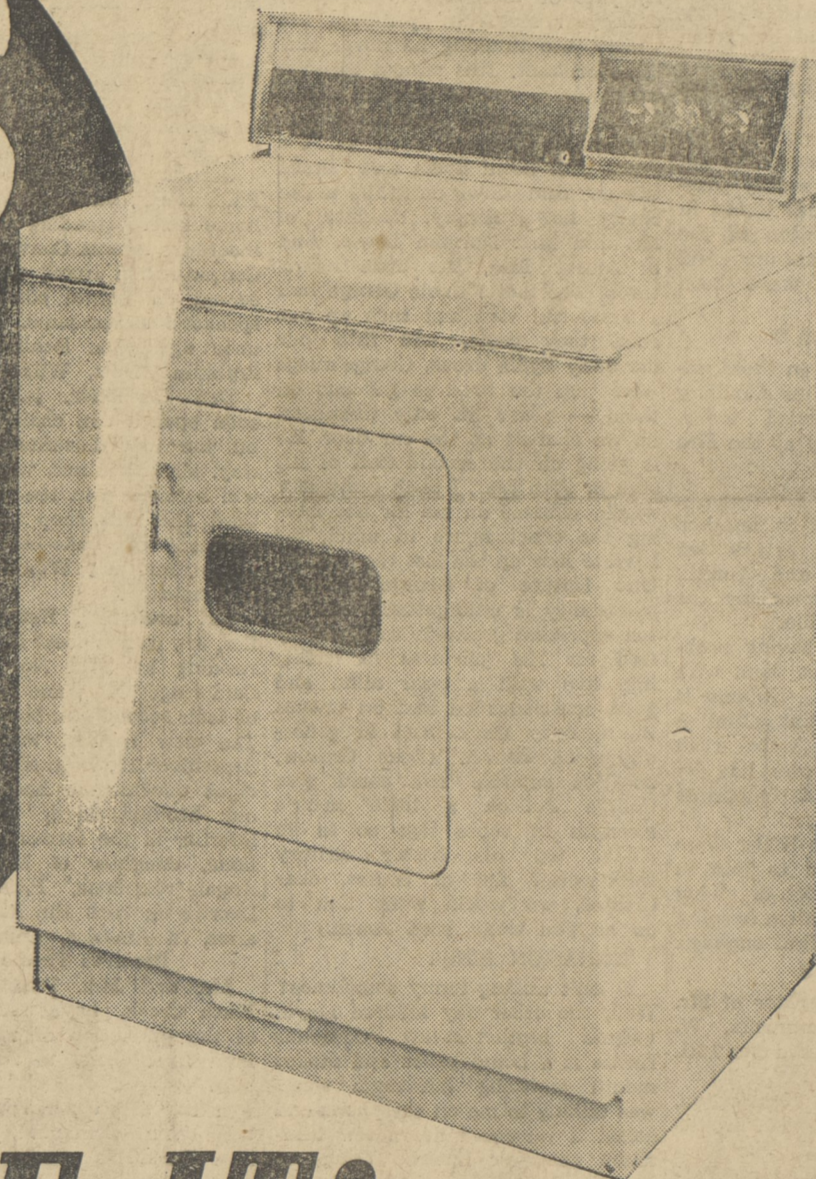
Summarized Bull

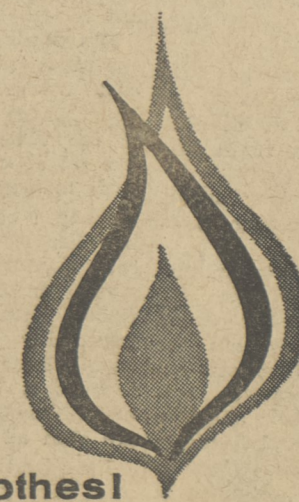
