Tucked away among her household treasures are dozens of lovely quilts and rugs she has made in her spare time, enjoying this art with crocheting and other types of handwork.

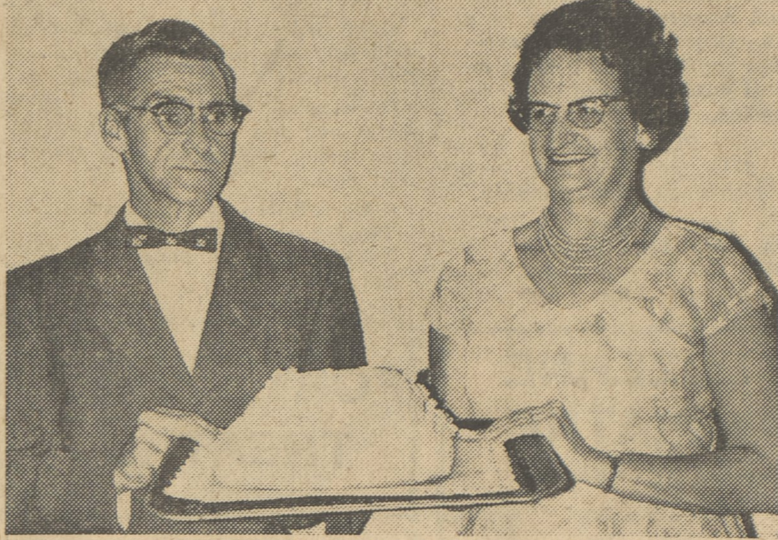
She likewise was interested in gardening and just this spring was able to get out in her garden to putter around.
