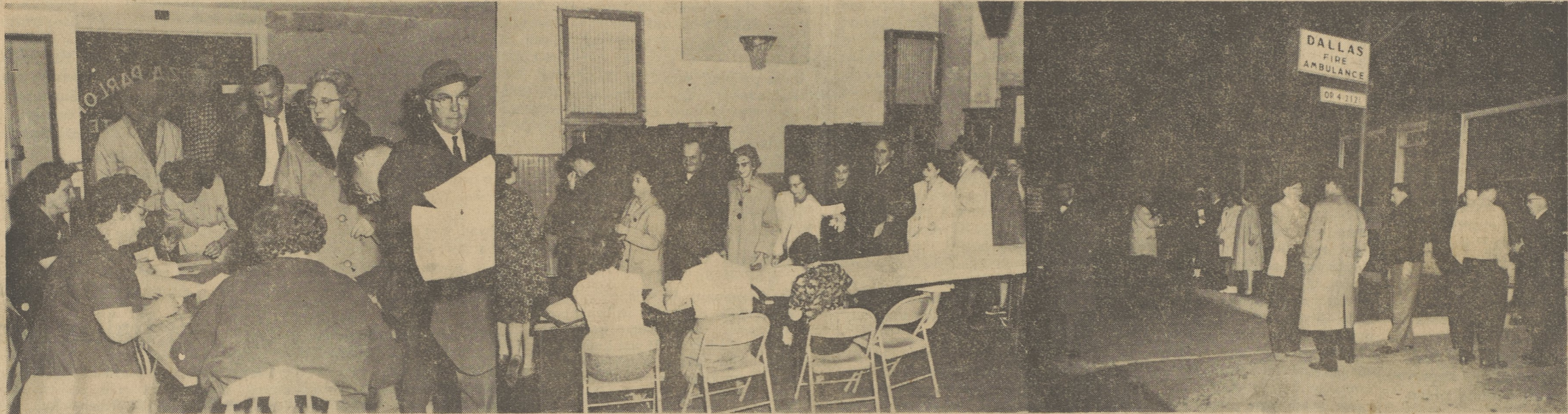

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Richardson And Kozemchak Win Director Seats

Republicans Sweep All Areas; Democrat Elected At Lake

The Republicans in the Back Mountain turned out in force to elect nearly all its candidates this week.

L. L. Richardson and Andrew Kozemchak won over Welton Farrar and Francis Dixon in the Dallas School Director race, although Farrar compiled the highest total ever given a Democrat school director in this area, with much backing from Republican supporters.

In Lehman, Mrs. Barbara Vivian a newcomer to politics, and Dean Shaver, easily captured the school seats in their township.

Moelwyn Williams (R), another newcomer, and Carl Swanson (D), will represent Harvey's Lake on the board.

In Jackson Township, M. Slimak and Vernon Cease won the director posts, and Noxen elected Ronald Fielding.

Four Republicans, three incumbent, were easily elected to Dallas Borough Council seats.

J. B. Post, Jr., and William Goss, Republican candidates for county commissioners, received solid backing of Back Mountain friends.

Referendum on a constitution convention was defeated locally, but the amendments found favor in the eyes of the voters.
