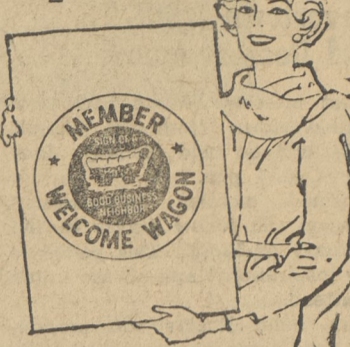
Basketball season is under way with six games of exhibition already played. The first contest in North League play will be January 7 when the hoopers meet Crestwood on the Dallas court.
