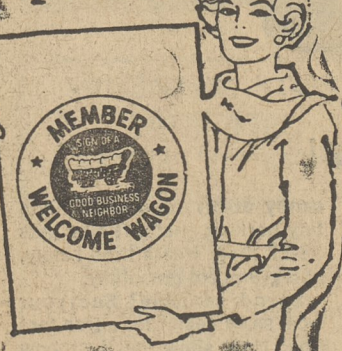
Honor Society News:

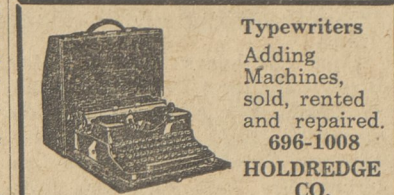
the journalism club. I'm sincerely grateful for the cooperation I've had and I hope Kay will have the same.
