**Transportation Is Available**

Transportation for donors wishing to visit the Bloodmobile on Friday, may arrange it through Mrs. Edward Gilroy. Baby-sitting service for those who must bring with them their small children, will be supplied at the Shavertown YMCA, where the Bloodmobile will be stationed from 11:45 to 5:45.

To keep themselves and their families eligible for receiving of blood in case of accident or illness, residents who are able to contribute are asked to do so. PTA groups are covered through semi-annual donation. Residents may join any PTA group in order to become eligible, through the Blood-Acure program.

Ten per cent of the membership must be represented at each donation, to keep the ledgers balanced. Blood will not be taken from anyone who is suffering from a cold or is otherwise indisposed. Persons over sixty may not contribute. One person in every family should make a point of attempting to contribute blood.

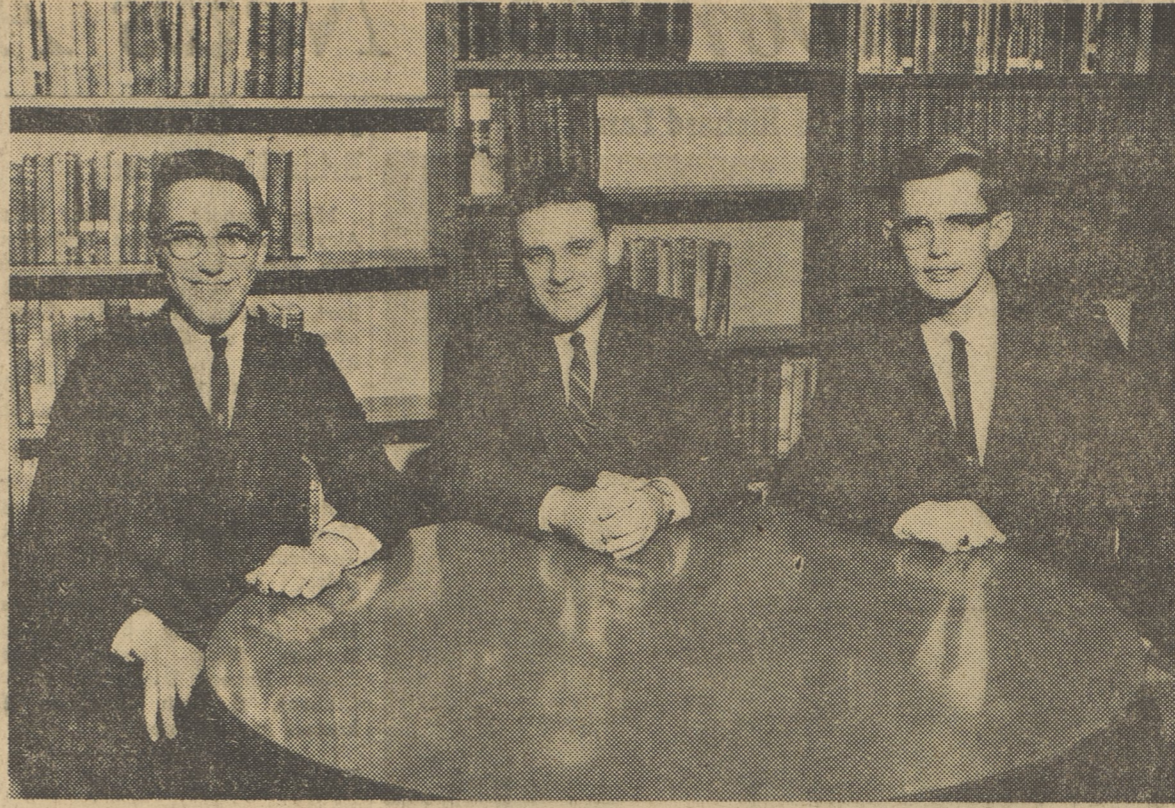
