## Hiking Gamelands

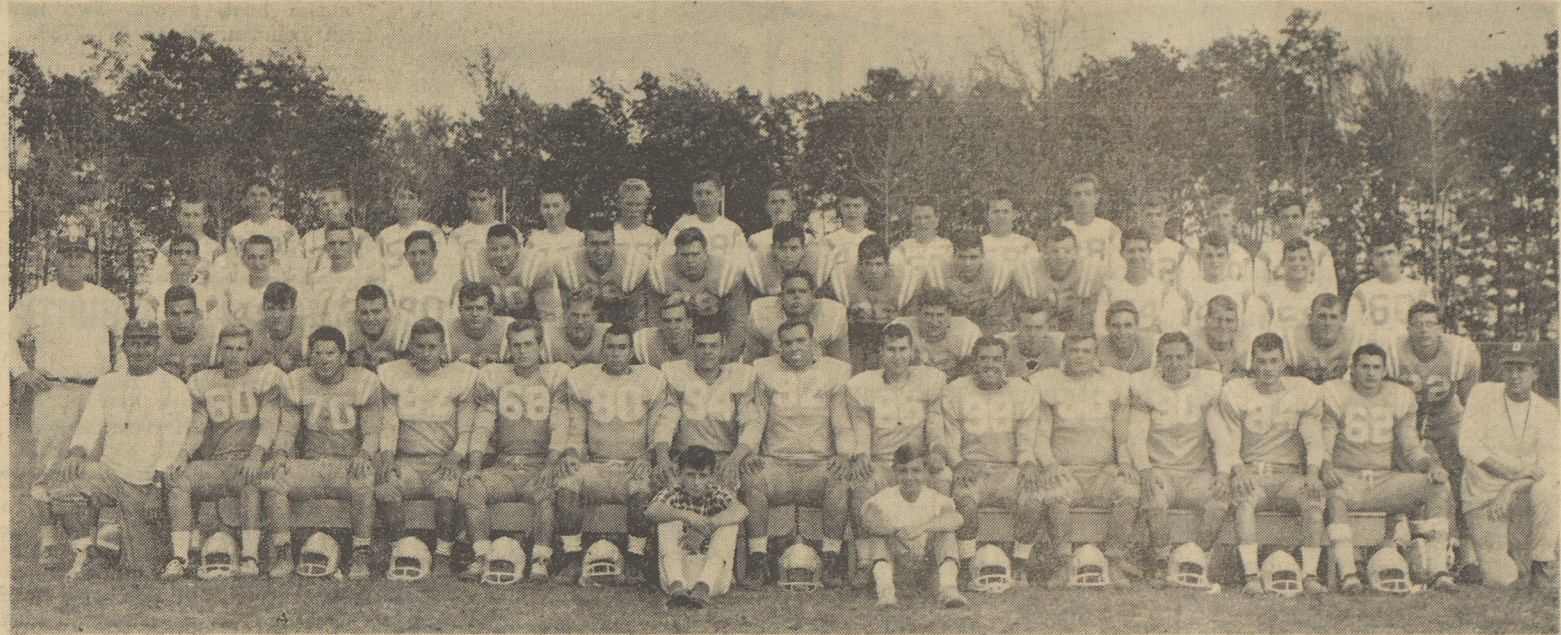

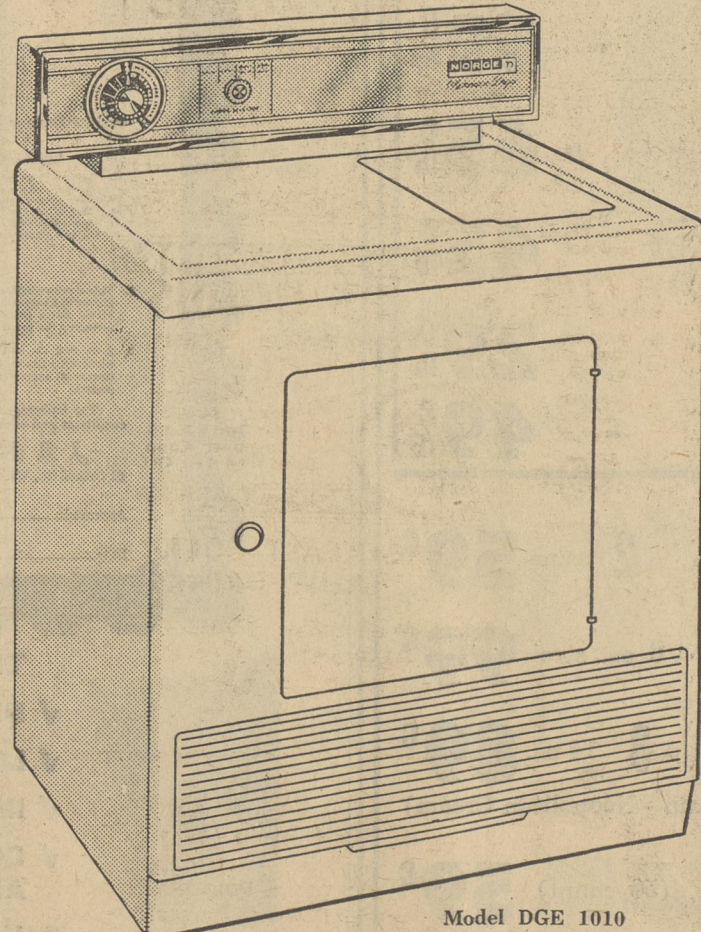
