Kole of Swoyersville congratulated the club on winning first position for eight consecutive months and for all but one month in the year to date.

The Dallas club's nearest competition came from the Pittston Kiwanis and the Forty Fort Kingston Club which tied at a score of 81.

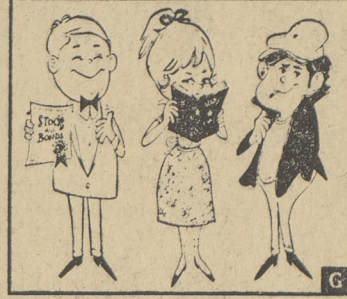
