Dallas Honor Roll Rules.
The Dallas Junior High School has adopted a standard set of rules for the Honor Roll to be posted each marking period. The rules are as follows:

- (a) Students studying five major subjects and receiving A's and B's allowing only one C. The overall average of major subjects must be at least 85.
- (b) In subjects reporting less than three times a week, pupils may have one D, but all other grades in these subjects must be C or above.
- (c) Any student who is studying only four major subjects must maintain a "B" average. If a student in this classification has one "C" in a full time subject, it is necessary to have an "A" in a full time subject to be available for the Honor Roll.
- (d) Major subjects are those which meet at least four times weekly.

To the first 100 candidates who earn the highest scores in the Commonwealth, scholarships of \$250 per academic year for four years of college will be given. Eighty scholarships for \$200 per academic year will be awarded on a County or senatorial district basis.
