She climbed the hill to the baked goods counter, regretted that there was none of Mrs. Peterson's homemade bread, but bought a pan of good rolls and some brownies, visited the plant booth where she bought some pink lily of the valley plants; was treated to a bag of pop-corn which she later ate while watching the auction; wandered down and took a book of chances on the arrow back settle but refused to chance a dollar on the new Valiant car for which she could see no use if she won; wandered along the Antiques table, commenting on the fine display and greeting old friends, Cora Gates and Alice Howell. She sat a while with son, Bruce, and watched the auction but didn't stay long enough to be lured into the bidding as she had been other years.

Granny is in excellent health, though if asked, she may deny this. The truth is that the only time she has any ailment is when she gets a pain in her back from straightening heavy rugs, moving furniture, pulling weeds, sweeping the porch and walk, or other jobs for which she has been unable to find a promptly ready hand. She considers herself hard of hearing but it is definitely not wise to discuss anything secret with in normal ear shot. Granny has an amazing store of knowledge about what is happening here abouts not limited to what is printed in the Dallas Post.

Everyday is a full one for Granny and her birthday was no exception. With her sister-in-law and good friend, Mrs. William J. Smith, she has gone every winter for 25 years to St. Petersburg, Fla., where they have always stayed at the Princess Martha Hotel. Last year she drove down with daughter, Margaret by way of Daytona Beach and Miami Beach and remained until later in March.

The youngest of three children of John E. and Eliza Johnson Smith, Mrs. Zeiser was born July 11, 1872 on a farm along the Berwick-Hazleton Turnpike.
