## Dallas Mill Supplies Order For The Congo

Natona Mills Trikot Division plant at Dallas has filled a \$24,091 order for nylon trikot fabric sold to the Congo (Leopoldville) through United States foreign aid financing, the Agency for International Development reported today.

Purchase by a Congolese manufacturer was financed under commodity import provisions of the U. S. economic development program authorizing procurement of materials required for economic growth. U. S. and other Free World assistance to the Congo is designed to advance economic growth and stability as an independent nation.

American firms produce more than 90 percent of all goods bought by developing countries through AID financing. Yearly U. S. volume of AID program exports is now at a billion dollar level.
