Neither will pollute the water. World's End State Park and Eagles Mere in Sullivan County are well-known tourist attractions, as is Ricketts Glen. Hunting and fishing areas are abundant.
Along the Susquehanna Valley runs Route 6, which follows in many places what was known as the Warrior Path of Indians from New York state south. Wyalusing Rocks were known as prayer rocks and a lookout point on the river.
In 1963 and again in 1964 Indians from reservations in the north came to the rocks on invitation of rock-owner Joe Kast, who also runs a tourist stand and restaurant there. More tourists came than Indians, however, and many were disappointed that there were no great games and displays at this, the "Grand Spiritual and Temporal Council, North American Indians, First in 208 Years", as Mr. Kast advertised in a brochure ahead of the event.

EMA distributed these brochures for Kast, and was promptly included in an unending stream of criticism launched by Editor Keeler for over-selling the cause. Another Council was held, on considerably smaller scale, in 1964, just to show it could be done, Shoemaker said.
Shoemaker also said that the Indian Councils would undoubtedly be held again, in the future, and would be of attraction to the tourist, probably in 1966.
Before the 1965 Council was cancelled, an article had been written and planned for inclusion in the Ford Times, and interest in photographing the event had been evinced by the National Geographic magazine, according to Shoemaker. Writer for the Ford Times wrote Shoemaker that Keeler's criticism both in his paper and in letters to state and national press media was responsible for the collapse of the Indian Council.
Executive Director started the EMA himself in 1960. He had no tourist promotional experience before this, but was employed with the Pennsylvania Fish Commission for 27 years.

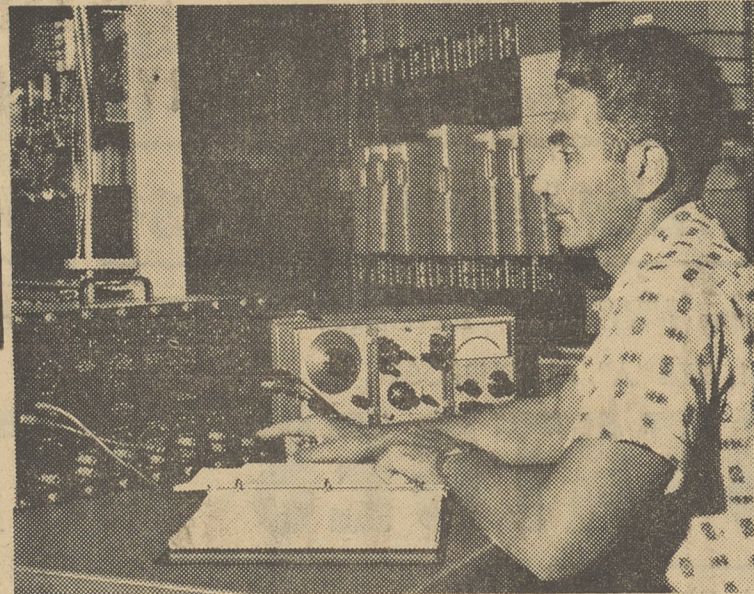
Captures Lovely Child Contest

Since greens would have to be seeded by September 1, though, and since there is earth-moving to be done, the contractor has advised against seeding until spring. He said the course would not be played until 1967 in any case, so little was lost in waiting.
A permit was granted last week by the Luzerne County Planning Commission for the \$250,000 course in Franklin Township.
Owners of the semi-private course will be Anthony Pileggi, part-owner of the restaurant in Kings-ton bearing his name, and Mr. Goeringer, both of whom were named originally as owners, and perhaps Ted Dymond, according to Mr. Goeringer. "We will do a lot of the work ourselves," he added.
Plans call for erection of a clubhouse and a liquor license has been applied for.
