

Two Local Students Will Enter Dickinson College This Weekend

Linda Davies, Machell Ave., and Alan Landis, Oak Hill are among the 391 freshmen that Dickinson College will welcome to its campus September 11 for four days of orientation prior to the formal start of the college's 193rd year.

The class - 138 women, 253 men - is slightly smaller than a year ago, but the all-college enrollment will be a record 1315 students.

Orientation will lay stress upon the academic adjustment of the new students and upon group discussions, under faculty leader, of books freshmen were expected to have read over the summer - "Function of Reason," "A Canticle for Leibowitz," "God and Man at Yale" and "Waiting for Godot".

Chosen from 2700 applicants, the class has an impressive average score of 625 in the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Boards, the women averaging somewhat higher than the men, according to Dean Samuel H. Magill.

He said about 30 percent of the freshmen will share in the record \$443,738 Dickinson will expend during the coming year in the form of

scholarships and other student aid. No applicants, he said, were rejected because of financial need.
