## Organ Recital

I can't say what the message was from it all but certainly there was skill to be marvelled at for, abscurely at the organ console, sat the young man who called for those notes and told them what to go and what to do. Years back of that, too, were the skills and minds of men like Bach, Liszt and others whose thoughts were set down as notes on bars and pages.
