Big To Do
 It was rather educational to learn so much about election procedures while covering the LaBerge-Bowen case before the courts. There was no doubt in my mind at all concerning the correct figures tallied by the South District of Dallas Township officials.

In case you didn't know, four copies of the votes recorded on the voting machines are made out by the majority inspector, the minority inspector and a clerk appointed for the day. The judge of elections reads from the machine as another watcher looks on. Two copies go to the Courthouse. These are called unofficial returns. One copy is kept by the minority inspector and the fourth is posted on the door or building where the election was held. Of the two copies sent to the courthouse one is sealed, one unsealed, the former being used for auditing purposes.

After Judge Lewis handed down his decision, it was clear that as the unofficial result was copied on official records, the error was made. Mrs. Lewis, Minority Inspector at the South District testifying that as she jotted down the results from two voting machines as 1 and 1, and 2 and 1, the figures were rather close and no plus sign had been provided. Just as Ray Williams said, the whole thing could have saved a lot of trouble and expense if the official count had been rechecked against the unofficial return. How the tax payers money can be wasted.

For complete information on the workings election night, I wish to thank Wilbur Nichols of Trucks-ville, who is thoroughly aware of proper procedure.

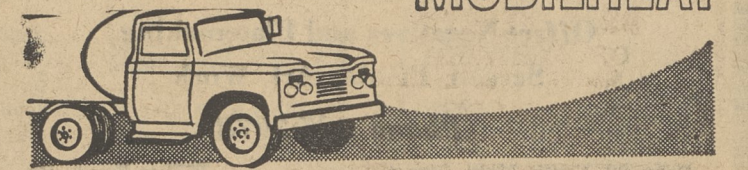
