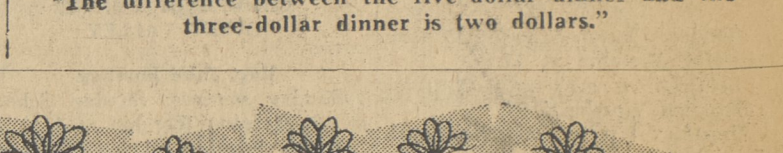
Have a Merry
