**Lobster Mousse Ring Stars At Ladies' Luncheon**



If you're planning a luncheon for the ladies soon, choose a dish that's delicious, unusual and attractive. Make Lobster Mousse Ring, a fluffy round of bits of lobster meat and flavorings with a gelatin base. Crushed double thin saltine crackers add that special subtle flavor. You decorate the ring with slices of cucumber and fill its center with salad greens. Serve with a plate of whole crackers and steaming coffee. Here's how:

- Lobster Mousse Ring**
- 6 double thin Sunshine Krispy Crackers
  - 1/4 cup cold water
  - 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
  - 1/2 cup boiling water
  - 1 lb. cooked, chopped or ground lobster meat, 2-lbs. (canned, fresh or frozen)
  - 3 tablespoons lemon juice
  - 1 teaspoon grated onion
  - 1/4 teaspoon Tabasco sauce
  - 1/4 cup minced parsley
  - 1/2 cup mayonnaise
  - 1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped
  - Whole Sunshine Krispy Crackers
- With blender or with rolling pin, crush crackers into coarse crumbs. (There should be about 1/2 cup.) Set aside. Place cold water in bowl, sprinkle with gelatin and let stand for 5 minutes. Add boiling water and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Let cool. Add lobster meat, crumbs, lemon juice, onion, Tabasco sauce, parsley and mayonnaise; blend well. Fold in whipped cream. Pour into a lightly oiled mold (4-cup capacity). Refrigerate until set. When ready to serve, unmold and garnish center of ring with salad greens. Accompany with a platter of whole crackers. Yield: 4 servings.
