It depends upon the point of view. One person focuses his eyes on the swamp, the other person lifts his eyes to the blue hills and the bluer sky beyond. He knows that the swamp is there, but why dwell on it, when there are lovelier things to see?

It is possible to be so completely bound within a small horizon that there is no chance to escape the small and maddening things which press on us from day to day. Step outside and look up at the stars on a frosty night. Revel in the purity of the new-fallen snow.

We can make a pledge to ourselves that we will not pass on malicious gossip, that we will not add fuel to a raging fire of hate, that we will not lend ourselves to destruction of cherished ideals by word or deed.

We have the most microscopic foothold in the Universe. Let us keep it swept and garnished. "When I consider the heavens, the work of thy fingers, the moon and the stars which thou hast ordained, what is man that thou art mindful of him, or the son of man that those visitest him?"
