The Holy Season Of Lent

Wednesday, February 23rd, ushers in the Holy Season of Lent. It is known as Ash Wednesday for on that day Ashes are imposed on the heads or foreheads of the faithful to remind them, in the words of the liturgical prayer—"Remember man that you are dust and into dust you shall return." This recalls for us the words of Genesis 11-7 and now from the clay of the ground, the Lord God formed man, breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and made man a living soul. It is further reminder that we should not pamper our body and therefore be more concerned with our flesh than we are of our soul, the life of God within us.

This is the theme of the day but if only for a day then we would quickly forget it and return to our ever pressing needs as we take up the work of our everyday life—but it ushers in a season, the Holy Season of Lent where we assume figuratively the sackcloth and ashes, in mortification, when we moderate our activities and spend our time on the problem of our soul's salvation. The churches will be more crowded, daily visits of meditation and prayer are the order of the day. Daily masses and devotions offered in the penitential robes of purple will remind us that we must search out in our own lives whatever is holding us back from God, and therefore renew our determination that our lives will be purposeful and our goal shall be to give God His rightful place in our lives, for this holy season must recall for each one of us our total dependence upon God.

Lent will end with the glory of the Resurrection. Our lives we pray will end with the glorious hope of the resurrection. Yes, Ash Wednesday is an important day on our calendar. It is another opportunity that God gives to each one of us to set our sights right and our life in tune with the harmonious Wisdom of God.

Follows Brother In Death By 3 Weeks

Miss Ida L. Grey, life resident of Outlet, died Monday morning at the home of her brother Clarence in Ruggles, with whom she had made her home for the past year.

Her brother Corey Grey, died January 26, a scant three weeks earlier.
Miss Grey, daughter of Smith and Sarah Wilson Grey, took over operation of the sixty-acre farm upon the death of her parents thirty-five years ago.

No leisure-time farmer, she milked the cows, sold butter and cottage cheese in Dallas (The Risleys were her customers), supervised a flourishing flock of hens, raised pigs for the fall butchering, and sold smoked hams and salt pork.

She had also a flock of sheep. In February she was on the alert for new lambs whose mothers would not accept them, pampering them with bottle feedings until they could return to the flock.

With all of this, she remained as dainty in appearance as a porcelain doll. Nobody ever saw her without a spic and span clean apron and earrings.

Five years ago she submitted to surgery, and as time went on, realized that she would never again be well. But she wanted to die, not in a hospital, but in either her own home or that of her brother Clarence, who is now the last of the six children.

Church affiliations were with Loyalville Methodist Church, where for years she taught Sunday School. She attended the one-room school house in Loyalville.
She will be buried this afternoon in Loyalville cemetery. Rev. Fred Elster, pastor of the Alderson Charge, officiating at 2 p.m. from the Bronson Funeral Home.

I doubt if anyone enjoys it more than I do. My granddaughter says "Grandma watches for the mailman Fridays, and then we don't see any more of her for hours, she reads that paper from beginning to end." I hope she enjoys something as much when she is 82.

Why do I enjoy it? My husband was a Methodist minister. We were sent to the Maple Grove Charge in 1906. We served Maple Grove, Loyalville, Ruggles, Mooretown and Meeker School-house.

Then we were moved to Center Moreland, Dymond Hollow, Vernon, and Demunds. Then we were moved to Lehman where we had Lehman, Idetown and Jackson churches.

Then we went to Bennett Memorial where we spent two happy years, and were then sent to South Wilkes-Barre to try to start a Methodist Church there. We held services in an old store building with a turned-up box for a pulpit to hold the Bible.

After we got the work nicely started, we asked for work on higher ground for we all had malaria quite badly.

I was back for the 50th anniversary celebration there at the Firwood Church.

Around 1914 we went without any promise of any salary or even a place to live.
Then we served in Trucksville for five years.
Do you wonder why I enjoy your paper?
I will be 83 years old April 12.
I had a wonderful time at Idetown in October, helping celebrate their centennial. We served there 1910, 1911, and 1912.
