JOTS FROM DOT

Jan. 2, 1966

Dearest Family, I'm on the plane returning from Lodja. Thought I'd better start to write about my trip before I get buried in the new school term at I. M. E.

About The Trip To Lodja
Christmas night Tina and Ede drove me to Leo. Ede and I were the only guests at U. M. H. We got there at 10:30, picked up my plane ticket. Next morning Ede drove me to the airport at 6 a. m. The plane left at 7 and got to Lodja in 3 1/2 hours. There is an hour difference in time, Lodja one hour ahead of Leo. Ethel was there to meet me of course. Saw lots of old friends during the week. There was a government exam on for school directors and inspectors and Emil Luhahi (Masters in Ed. from U.S.A.) was on the jury. One day we went to town to where the exam was given and saw many, many former Monitor School students and former teachers now in high government positions. Though many had left the Mission for disciplinary or other reasons, they are very proud of their Protestant background and brag that all the important educational posts in the Province are held by Protestants. Many of these men are strong supporters of the Church, too. I saw them at the New Year's service, but that's a week ahead of the story.

Her Mission To Lodja, etc.
I had brought plaster with me to make a form to make a brace for Kuhu's back -- she's the girl with polio that Ethel and I got the left-handed wheelchair for. Ethel and I looked around for a truck going to W. N. -- the plane was occupied elsewhere -- and to our joy we found the Church truck was going with medicines and some things of the Bishop's and we could ride along. The D. S. agreed for the truck to stay for a whole day and take us out to Kuhu's village. He also instructed the chauffeur to take us by way of Djala, the huge

new village founded in 1963 when two tribal factions in the Lodja region fought and the "Plains people" were driven back toward Wembo Nyama area by the "Forest people". The refugees settled in the one area and built the village which stretches over 20 kilometers along the road. The D. S. insisted we had to see Djala and of course we were eager to.

They are building a new church building and the village people themselves have put up classrooms for the full 6 grades of primary school and are requesting a junior high next. All this building is voluntary, without using a cent of foreign funds, though they are needing some money for proper teaching materials. The village is big we have 2 dispensaries and several lower grade classrooms in different locations. Besides our schools, the Catholics and government also have them and it seems that most if not all the children are in school.

The most striking thing I noticed on the trip was the huge number of small children everywhere. At one village I remarked on it and the people said, "Yes, and there are more boys being born because so many men were killed in the fighting last year." Of course, there are always more boys born than girls, and at another place they said there were more girls! Anyway the birth rate is going right ahead, especially among the mission workers, and the women plead with me to send them birth control medicine. I've already written to the next doctor who is going to visit to take a big supply of the new things with him.
