

Back Mountain Schools Win Three District Two Wrestling Championships

Dallas Matmen Cop Two Crowns; Sorber Wins For Lake-Lehman

Three 1966 District 2 Wrestling crowns were won by Back Mountain matmen Saturday night in the Wyoming Valley Tournament at Wilkes College gymnasium. Steve Kaschenbach and Mark Dymond won titles for Dallas Senior High School and Walt (Chip) Sorber brought home a victory to Lake-Lehman. Two other Dallas matmen, Tom Finn and Harry Cooper, lost in the final round and finished in second place.

An outstanding performance was given by Steve Kaschenbach at 127 pounds. He fashioned four pins, the ultimate goal in wrestling, in the two day tournament. On Friday night, he took down Plymouth's Pasternak in 3:15 and Sorber of Lake-Lehman in 23 seconds. In the semi-finals on Saturday afternoon, he pinned Grimes of GAR in the third period, then came back in the finals to take Hanover's Novinski in 3:58. Steve handed Novinski his first defeat a week before in the Hanover-Dallas meet.

Dallas' other champ was Mark Dymond at 145. Mark, just out of a sick-bed, decided Forty Fort's Cecoli, 2-0, in the final bout. Earlier he advanced past Yoziak of Hanover, 10-1. Friday, he met Dunbar of Meyers. Mark came from behind, 4-1 in the first period, to win on time advantage, 7-6.

Lake-Lehman's lone titlist, Chip Sorber, won the title at 120. (Chip's brother, Jack, took the District and Regional crowns two years ago at 145.) Chip decided Morris, GAR, 3-0, Friday night and came back to post a victory over Meyers' Malia in the semi-finals. He finished up

the contest Saturday night with a decision over Petrella of Hanover, 12-2.

Tom Finn at 133 lost to Kingston's Davis, 4-0, in the finals and Harry Cooper, 154, was pinned by Skrepenak of Coughlin in 3:01.

Two Lake-Lehman contestants and one from Dallas were eliminated in the semi-finals. The Knights' Woodling at 145, and heavyweight Lamoreaux lost to Ciccoli of Forty Fort and Brezna of Hanover. Tim Houlihan, 138, Dallas, was pinned in overtime after a scoreless bout with Tom Jones of Kingston, who had beaten him decisively before.

The two Back Mountain wrestling teams began the tourney in fine shape. Dallas had five men entering the semi-finals, following just behind Kingston and Hanover, who advanced nine men each. Lake-Lehman entered three in the semis.

Dallas finished the season with a 7-2 record. Although it began with only a light turnout and, due to injuries, only seventeen showed up for the last few practices, the Dallas matmen had the best season since wrestling was introduced in the school. The team's success is a result of hard work and determination on the part of the boys who stuck it out, and much credit goes to Coach Al Husband for ending up third in conference against a true All-Wyoming Valley competition.

Steve's record came as a result of six years of work. Mark and Harry Cooper entered the sport in high school with no previous background in it. Both worked hard, determined to come out on top. Mark, who was sick throughout the District tournament, overcame his illness to come out victorious. Mark was inactive throughout last year's season after he was injured in an automobile accident in December.

Followers of athletic events in the area should know by now that good athletes are not born. They are the product of hard work and determination. When a youngster shows interest in a sport and the family shows enthusiasm and backs them up, there's a good chance the boy will turn out to be a good athlete.

The three District 2 finalists will compete in the Regionals at Muhlenburg College Saturday. The semi-finals will begin early in the afternoon.

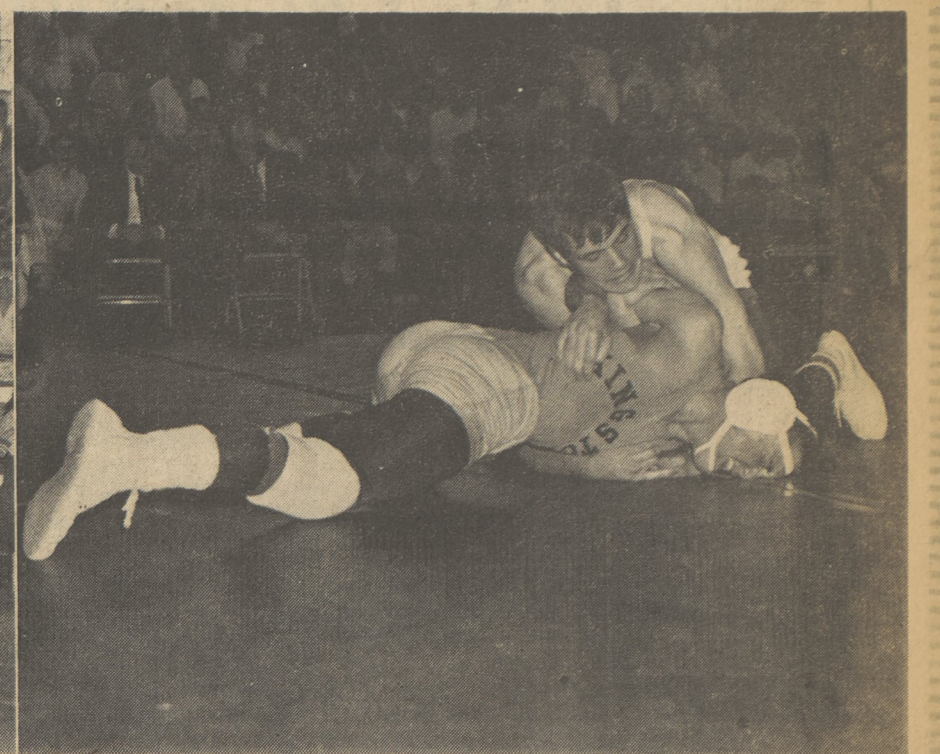
