From Behind Iron Curtain, Dr. Urban To Speak At Orange Methodist

Dr. John Urban, a Protestant minister from Czechoslovakia, behind the Iron Curtain, will be guest speaker at a Lenten service held at the Orange Methodist Church on Thursday, March 24th at 7:30 p.m. He will speak on the life of the Church in his country and of the role of the Church in easing the tensions of the world.

Dr. Urban, who came to our country last December, is serving for six months as the representative of the Ecumenical Council of Churches of Czechoslovakia to the Church Center for the United Nations in New York. During his stay in the United States he is observing the work of the U.N., speaking to seminars at the Church Center, writing articles for the church press in his country, and preaching in American Churches.

Born in Moravia in 1920, Dr. Urban taught school for six years in his native village. He began his theological education after the war. Included in his education was a year at Princeton Theological Seminary in 1948-1949. Before coming to the United States, last fall, he was serving as a pastor in the university city of Brno. He is a minister of the Unity of Czech Brethren (Congregational). For ten years he has served on the Executive Council of his denomination.

The service to be held at Orange Methodist Church next Thursday is one of a series of Lenten services of the Carverton Charge. The public is invited to attend.

Dallas WSCS Hears Talk By Missionary

A missionary from a leper colony in Liberia spoke to members of Dallas WSCS last Tuesday afternoon, showing slides to illustrate her talk.

Miss Elsa Ebbestaadt, a native of Norway, is home on furlough from her work in the mission field, where she is supported by members of an Avoca church. During her year at home, she expects to speak to many such groups of women, to bring to them the needs of the natives, and the challenge to further missionary effort.

This is a climate which few white people can endure, with its torrential rains and its overpowering humidity. Supplies are dropped by a plane which must select its season carefully, as the clearing is small and often veiled by fog.

Malaria is common, insects and snakes abound.

Until modern drugs were discovered, there was no way of arresting leprosy, once it had been contracted. Miss Ebbestaadt said that the disease is not very contagious, if proper precautions are observed, and that she has no fear of contracting it.

Because of contamination, every drop of water, hauled from the river in a vessel atop the carrier's head, must be boiled before drinking.

The native diet is mainly rice. Housing is primitive, with side walls non-existent, and crude fireplaces in the middle of the shack.

Dallas WSCS sends bandages to her for use of the lepers, and sends quilt patches to another missionary in Africa, Dottie Gilbert in the Congo.

Dear Folks,

While waiting at the Provincial office for some diploma business I will write a letter which I didn't get done over the week-end. I was on O. R. call, and Maternity Saturday night, and while I didn't have so many calls, I worked a lot on getting more Nursing Arts notes in order and mimeographed.

A New Experience

Friday night we had something exciting -- first one ever done at IME and first one I have ever seen -- an exchange transfusion of a new-born baby. At home there are quite a lot done for RH incompatibility but here most everybody is RH positive so we don't see that, at least that we know of. This was suspected to be incompatibility of the major groups, which is rare. The mother was O and the baby A so somehow the mother may have developed antibodies to the baby's blood cells, and they crossed the placenta and began destroying the baby's cells. The diagnosis had to be a guess because we don't have the stuff to do an antibody titer, but something was destroying the cells. We have a CPRA lady pediatrician, Margaret Davis of Indiana, who did this. She took a pint of O blood and put it in the baby 10cc at a time and each time took 10cc of the baby's A blood out and threw it away. At the end the baby should have only 15% of its own blood left and the rest the strange blood. After a few weeks the antibodies will die off and the baby will manufacture its own cells.

Is all that clear?

Ha! It isn't even clear to me! I don't know just why I never got to see one of those before -- probably because I never worked in pediatrics as a graduate where they are done. In midwifery, if there is possibility of an RH problem we don't get the case.

Another Chest Case

Saturday we had another chest case -- a girl was working in the field and a hunter mistook her for an animal (sounds like the U. S.!). She had a bullet in tiny pieces all through her chest. Dr. Frazer put in two tubes and got out a couple of quarts of blood. I don't know how she is today because I left early to come to Leo.

More About Her Furlough

Yes, I am taking my furlough at the exact time it is due, even though it is in the middle of the school year, so I can be home for November 14, 1967. I expect to come just before Christmas 1966 and return just after Christmas 1967.
