Island Handy For Kitchen

A kitchen island is a great thing to have, and one can be added to many existing kitchens.

Often the island is designed for a special operation - cooking or salad making. But the best plan is to let it work as auxiliary space for every other work center in the kitchen, and to build it three or more inches lower than standard counter height. The lower surface is ideal for rolling out pastries, beating, creaming and blending.

Make storage in the island count. Build in pot and lid racks, food knife for spices and condiments, knifes racks, and storage files designed to let baking tins stand on edge. Include flour and sugar bins if needed.

The island top should be a laminated hardwood for use as a chopping block and pastry center. It's also perfect as a place to set out serving dishes or hot pans and casseroles.

The rest of the island can be built of a softwood lumber like Douglas fir, ponderosa pine, or western hemlock. There's no need to match existing kitchen cabinets since the island will stand out as an individual piece.

Sun Colors

Use sunny colors for basement rooms. Recommended woods for paneling and cabinetwork are champagne colored hemlock and silvery Idaho white pine.
